## Thirst-Quenching Beverages For Summer Days

It's that time of year when lemonade tastes better than usual and iced tea or coffee finds its way to many a table every day. Yes, it's summertime! Whether it's a fruit beverage, a cola drink, or a nutritious milk shake they're all good on the prevalent warm days that come with "the good

old summertime."

Here are a number of suggestions. Don't forget the old favorites like lemonade and iced tea, but do try some of these thirst-quenching beverages.

For that party or reception you're planning this summer:

**Festive Punch**  
3 quarts unsweetened pineapple juice.

Juice of 8 lemons.

Juice of 8 oranges.

Juice of 2 limes.

2 cups sugar.

1 cup mint leaves.

4 quarts pale dry ginger ale.

2 quarts carbonated water.

Combine fruit juices, sugar, and mint leaves; mix thoroughly; chill.

Just before serving, add ginger ale and carbonated water. Float thin lemon and lime slices that have been studded with a whole clove for a party touch. Recipe makes 35 servings.

For a different kind of iced tea, try it spiced:

**Spiced Iced Tea**  
8 cups boiling water.  
1 teaspoon whole cloves.  
1 tablespoon broken cinnamon bark.  
2 tablespoons black tea.  
1/2 cup lemon juice.  
1/2 cup orange juice.  
Sugar to taste.

Pour water over spices and tea. Let steep for five minutes. Strain, cool, and chill. Add remaining ingredients and serve in glasses filled with chopped ice. Garnish with mint leaves and a lemon slice.


Make your own ice cream sodas:

**Chocolate Ice Cream Soda**  
3 tablespoons chocolate syrup.  
Carbonated water.  
Ice cream.

Add a little carbonated water to syrup and stir. Add as much ice cream as desired and fill glass with carbonated water. To give your soda that "soda fountain" look, garnish with whipped cream and sprinkle with chipped chocolate or top with a cherry. Use large glasses for sodas.

Other refreshing beverages that can be made with ice cream are made by mixing:

1. Root beer with ice cream.  
2. Cola drinks with ice cream.  
3. Any flavored soda pop with ice cream.

solutely vital utilities and industries.

4. Limit electricity for members of the occupation forces in Berlin—there are nearly 30,000 Americans, British and French in the city—to two periods a day, from 6 a.m. to 8:30 a.m., and from 6 p.m. to 11 p.m. An extra hour would be allowed on Saturday nights.

The measures will become effective at midnight tomorrow. Howley said.

An obvious result of the drastic power cuts was the prospect of greatly increased unemployment, which will make more difficult the task of the occupying powers.

The U. S. and British air forces were studying plans to fly in more coal—about 160 tons was brought here in sacks by plane yesterday—by modifying bombers to permit them to drop coal while in flight on designated fields in western areas of Berlin.

Howley assured the German population, that the present food ration can be maintained, and explained that the cuts in transport and power were necessary to devote maximum effort to bringing food by air.

They voted to hold over his head a resolution commanding the governors who reportedly fought the lobby-breaking proposal. Dewey's purported comments on the teachers' lobby were quoted recently by a Washington columnist.

Minnesota—Sen. Joseph H. Ball, R., Minn., announced he will seek renomination in the September primaries. He reiterated his opposition to the European recovery program and replied to charges against his voting record by the Minnesota Federation of Labor. There have been reports that Harold E. Stassen, who lost out in his bid for the party's presidential nomination, may oppose Ball for the senate seat.

Walace—Henry A. Wallace, third party presidential candidate, resigned as a contributing editor of the magazine New Republic. He did so, he said, to leave the editors "completely free to support, without any embarrassment whatsoever, the candidate and party which most appeal to them."
