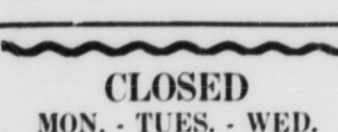

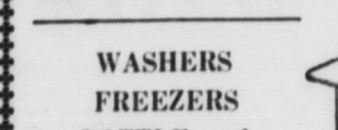

## 17 Die Accidental Deaths In Indiana

## 12 Traffic Victims Reported In State

Indianapolis, Aug. 2 — (UP) — Seventeen persons died of acciden- tal deaths in Indiana Saturday and Sunday.

There were 12 traffic victims four drowned and two died in mis- cellaneous accidents.

Sunny and pleasant weekend weather lured thousands onto high- ways and caused numerous acci- dents in all parts of the state.

The worst single accident was at Fort Wayne Saturday morning when four members of one Ohio family were killed as their car sideswiped a truck.

In addition to the four drown- ing victims, Eugene Kerns, 20, Val- paraiso, died of a broken neck when he dove into Flint Lake from a pier and struck a rock.

The other drowning victims were James Schoon, Merrillville, and Jerome S. Stripeik, 12, Chicago, who drowned in separate acci- dents in Lake Michigan off a Gary beach, and Robert Sharon, 20, Marion, who drowned while swimming in New Lake, in Whitley county.

Kenneth Crabtree, 17, Poseyville, was killed when he fell off a tractor Saturday and was crushed to death beneath the vehicle's wheels.

In another freak accident, 77-year-old James Sowers of Covington was killed when a truck loaded with planks sideswiped his auto. One of the long boards crashed through his auto's windshield, strik-

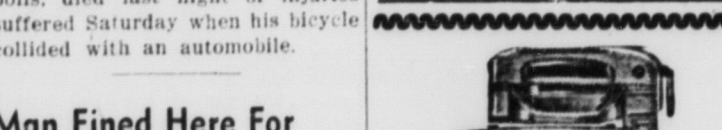

## 'Ball Of Fire' Is Reported Sighted

## Sight Reported By Hoosier Residents

Indianapolis, Aug. 2 — (UP) — A couple of hundred Hoosiers were ready to swear today that they saw a ball of fire bouncing around the sky last night, shooting off spirals of sparks like a Roman candle.

The "ball of fire" was sighted shortly before midnight by resi- dents of Indianapolis and vicinity. They flooded newspapers, radio sta- tions, the weather bureau, police and local army fields with tele- phone calls.

Nearly everyone said the fire ball came out of the east, drifted first south, then west and north into a cloud and disappeared.

One of the witnesses was city police inspector Leolin Troutman. He said he watched it for 20 min- utes.

Capt. Joe Fernandes, officer of the day at Stout Field, said one excited caller told him he saw a "flaming flying disc."

The airport weather bureau re- ported its observers did not see the ball of fire. Neither did two Trans-World Airlines pilots who left their course to investigate the ball over the city.

Emsley Johnson, Jr., a member of the Indiana Astronomical so- ciety, said he didn't see the ball of fire. But he said he thought it was just a practical joke.

"A long time ago I used to send up large paper balloons on the Fourth of July," he said. "They had inflammable material immers- ed in kerosene in the bottom. As it burned the gas filled the balloon and sent it up. They stay up as long as the fire burns."

Johnson said it might have been a similar type of balloon from some experimental station.

"Then again," he added, "maybe somebody's having some fun."

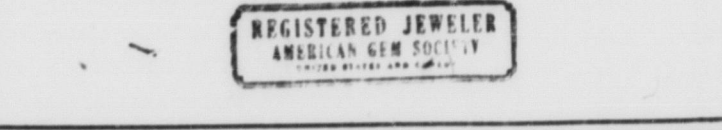
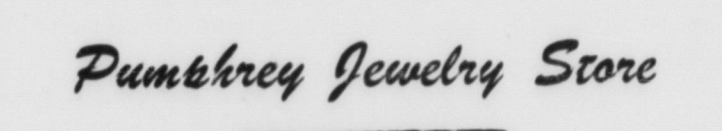
