Dewey to Ask For Cabinet Pay Boost

To Ask Increase If Elected President

Pawling, N. Y., Aug. 9—(UP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey will ask congress to increase the salaries of cabinet officers and other top governmental employees if he is elected president, it was learned reliably today.

The Republican presidential candidate, it was said, believes the best way to obtain more efficient public servants is "to pay them more." He feels the government must come closer to matching the salaries of private industry.

Dewey followed that policy when he took over the governor's chair at Albany. He is the only state employee not to receive a pay raise since the Republicans took over the state administration.

The governor said the state chief executive should be paid more than the \$25,000 he now receives, but that he would not recommend such a change while he remains in office.

Dewey virtually ended his "vacation" at his Quaker Hill farm to begin preparation for his nationwide campaign. The governor will return to Albany Wednesday to "clean up" state business and work on speeches he will deliver during his drive.

Dewey will confer with his running mate, Gov. Earl Warren of California and his chief political adviser Herbert Brownell, Jr., next Monday on the campaign and travel routes. Warren will be a guest at the executive mansion in Albany Monday and Tuesday to discuss the campaign plans.

The GOP nominee remained silent on the action of the special session of congress, but it was generally believed that his first campaign speech would deal with the high cost of living. He is expected to blame the Truman administration for inflation.

rationing was on," she said. George Rieffler, an independent butcher, said sales have fallen off considerably but he was prepared for the full force of this week's strike because "we just bought less."

"I expect the strike to pass over in two or three weeks," he said. A chain store butcher said his company's business had not been hurt yet but he did not know what to expect under the strike.

He agreed with the women, however, that meat prices were too high.

Walter Hammond, president of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, termed the meat strike "useless and senseless." He predicted that it would "fall flat on its face."

H. P. Jones, manager of the Dallas Swift and company plant, denied reports that livestock was being diverted to other markets during the strike. He said that thus far "it has not hurt us."

Man Is Accused Of Slaying His Nephew

New Castle Man Is Held After Death

New Castle, Ind., Aug. 9—(UP)—Police today accused Francis Blevins, 27, of shooting his nephew to death here Saturday night during a family argument in front of his house.

Henry county prosecutor Robert M. Brown said murder charges would be filed against Blevins sometime today.

The victim of the shooting was Rease Blevins, 19, an Anderson factory worker who recently moved to Emporia, Ind. He was employed by General Motors corporation.

Police said Blevins shot the youth after he tried to remove the keys from a car belonging to his brother-in-law, Estel Decker, Louisville, Ky. He said Decker's wife was sitting in the car, parked in front of the house.

Blevins said the argument started when the youth grabbed the keys. Police said the victim was cut on the wrists in the scuffle that followed. Then the elder Blevins went into the house and got a shotgun, came back and shot the nephew. He died of chest wounds before arrival at the hospital. Blevins was held in Henry county jail pending filing of charges.

Three Men Arrested On Smuggling Charge

Investigate Scheme To Smuggle Linen

Indianapolis, Aug. 9—(UP)—Three men were in custody today as authorities investigated a \$17,000 scheme to smuggle linen from an unused hospital at Camp Atterbury and sell it in Chicago.

The three were Abraham Levi, 67, president of the Elwood, Ind., Iron and Metal Co., Lt. John Ward, 39, post engineer at the camp, and Ward's brother, Bernard, 40, a Calumet City bartender.
