Schuman Called To Form New Cabinet

Ramadier Fails To Form Government

Paris, Aug. 30 (UPI)—Former premier Robert Schuman, whose government toppled last month over his opposition to cutting the French armed forces, was called upon today to form a new government.

Schuman was asked by president Vincent Auriol to try to weld a coalition cabinet together after former premier Paul Ramadier made a quick weekend attempt and admitted failure.

Schuman is expected to give Auriol a definite answer by the end of the day on whether or not he can form a cabinet.

Auriol was understood to be opposing long negotiations on grounds they would open the door to the two extremes represented by

the communists and De Gaulleists.

Schuman is a popular Republican and Ramadier is a Socialist.

Ramadier announced he could not form a government because the radical Socialists, considered a middle of the road group along with the Socialists and popular Republicans, refused to give him full support.

The crisis, which sent France into her third day without a government, was considered to be the most serious in the brief life of the fourth Republic.

It has precipitated, as was the crisis that toppled Schuman's coalition government last month, a new series of economic and financial difficulties.

Solution of the crisis calls for drastic retrenchments in government spending and other financial and economic measures which the communists in the government of premier Andre Marie refused to endorse. Marie's government fell Friday night.


