## Spahn, Lemon Scheduled As Day's Hurlers

Boston, Oct. 7 — (UP) — The brilliant pitching which marked the first game figured to continue in the world series today as Warren Spahn of the Boston Braves faced Bob Lemon of the Cleveland Indians.

It didn't figure to be a thriller like yesterday when Johnny Sain beat Bobby Feller to give the Braves a 1 to 0 victory in one of the best hurling duels in series history. But Spahn and Lemon are pretty close to being as good as they come, and if they are in form this afternoon it could be another battle that will go right down to the wire.

With a left hander going for the Braves, manager Lou Boudreau, downhearted but still confident, announced two lineup changes. Alie Clark, who makes a specialty of rifling line drives off southpaws, will play right field and bat second, with Walt Judnich going on the bench. Centerfielder Larry Doby, who hit second yesterday, will hit seventh.

The rest of the Indian lineup will be the same, as will the Braves batting order. Bill Salkeld, who drew the opening day catching job, will start in that post again.

"Naturally, we felt badly about not getting Feller a run out there yesterday," Boudreau said. "But I'm still sure we'll win the series. Doby will go again in Cleveland Sunday—if not before—and we'll do better by him then."

It was a tough one for the Iowa fireballer to lose, for he yielded only two hits in turning in one of the most brilliantly pitched games in series history. But he made the mistake of passing Salkeld to start off the Braves' eighth and then with men on second and first with two out, grooved a fast ball for Tommy Holmes.

The Braves right fielder belted it down the third base line and Phil Masi, running for Salkeld, came in to score the run which gave the Braves victory.

"I thought I had Holmes set up for that fast one," Feller said. "The time before he was up, it was the same count—one and one—and he drove my fast one back to me."

Feller was downcast, for this had been the big chance he had been

waiting for—a shot at a world series game. He did very well, but not well enough.

Marv Rickert, who was called up from Milwaukee the week the season closed to take the place of the injured Jeff Heath, got the only other hit off Feller.

As for Sain, he, too, hurled a great game. He yielded only four hits, and with runners on the bases, bore down to close the door on the Indians, whose batting power to left field was hampered by a strong wind.

Not since Bucky Harris, then managing the Yankees, put the winning run on base in the 1947 series, has there been the second guessing which plagued Boudreau today.

The second guessers were wondering why he ordered Eddie Stanky passed in the Braves' eighth inning.

Salkeld had started that inning with a walk—the second of three which Feller yielded—and was sacrificed to second by Mike McCormick. Boudreau then ordered Feller to pass Stanky to get Sain.

That strategy almost worked, for with Sain at bat, Feller whirled around and threw to Boudreau at second. He stabbed at the fallen Phil Masi, running for Salkeld, but umpire Bill Stewart, a National leaguer who had been in several hot disputes during the season, called Masi safe.

Boudreau protested and said later in the Indians dressing room that "I had him—but these are the best umpires in the game and that's that."

Stewart's decision meant only one man was out. So when Sain fled to right it was only two down instead of three. That brought up Holmes, who produced the game-winning hit.

The whole business caused a lot of baseball folk to wonder whether Boudreau was smart in ordering Stanky passed. They pointed out that the spark-plug second baseman was playing on an injured ankle and did not have his usual sharpness at the plate. But Boudreau looked at it this way:

"Stanky is a great guy in the clutch. I know Sain is a good hitter as pitchers go, but my reports are that he hits a lot of balls on the ground. So I gambled for a double play. I would do the same thing again."

The Braves' opening victory shortened the odds but still left the Indians the favorite to win the best four out of seven series. They now are 10 to 7 to win the series, 6 to 5 to win today's second game.

They were 13 to 5 to win the series before yesterday's game.

The forecast for today was for fair and cool weather.

## 3,500 Croppies And Bass Are Released

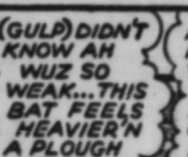
