Two Sentenced To Death For Gandhi Murder

Assassin, Brains Behind Conspiracy, Sentenced To Death

New Delhi, Feb. 10 — (UP) —

Nathuram Vinayak Godse, 36, the assassin who shot Mohandas K.

Gandhi, and Narayan Dattarya

Apte, 35, a school teacher described as the brains behind the con-

spiracy, were sentenced to death by hanging today.

Five of seven other defendants were sentenced to life imprisonment. One was acquitted and one was granted a king's pardon because he turned state's evidence and testified against the others.

Gandhi, the spiritual leader of Hindu India, was killed by three bullets fired into his frail body on the terrace of Birla house here during an evening prayer meeting on Jan. 30, 1948.

Godse admitted the shooting in a 30,000-word statement during the long trial of the nine defendants. He said he held Gandhi's code of non-violence responsible for the suffering and death of thousands of Hindus after the partition of India. He invited the court to impose the death sentence.

Winds Drift Snow Back On West Roads

New Major Storm Forms In Aleutians

Parts of the west were whipped today by "quickie" windstorms and snow squalls that pushed new piles of snow over roads as fast as bulldozers cleared them.

A new major storm area was spawned in the Aleutians and was moving southeastward toward the continental coastline.

Nightlong rains melted snowdrifts in eastern Washington, creating flood conditions. Water poured into Dayton, Wash., and crept over Walla Walla sidewalks. Residents of the two towns turned out to erect sandbag barricades. Highways became muddy, swirling streams.

But eastern states enjoyed mild, springlike weather that sent temperatures soaring yesterday to 59 at New York and 68 at Washington to set new records for Feb. 9.

Snowplow crews gave up hope of restoring transportation lines today into Rawlins, Wyo., as 35 and 45 mile, an hour winds whistled over the area.

Perishable foods were running low in the city, the last major community still snowbound as result of storms that struck earlier this week. The Challenger airlines said that if weather permitted it would begin a shuttle service for 650 westbound railroad passengers stranded there.

Snowplow crews measured a drift that was 50 feet high near Rawlins.

The Union Pacific and other railroads gradually were moving snowbound trains in other parts of Wyoming by re-routing them to Utah and Denver to be dispatched over the Santa Fe and Denver and Rio Grande rights of way.
