

Helicopter Pilot Rescues Hurt Boy

San Francisco Boy Returned To Safety

Yosemite National Park, Cal., Aug. 4. — (UP) — Helicopter pilot Ray Deming today brought back to safety a San Francisco boy who fractured his skull in a remote mountain area of Yosemite Park four days ago.

Deming flew 12-year-old Terence Hallinan, son of San Francisco attorney Vincent Hallinan, from Benson lake, 8,500 feet up in the Sierra Nevada mountains, to Whitewater, a settlement in the valley. There the boy was transferred from the plane to an ambulance and rushed to Lewis Memorial hospital, 36 miles away.

Deming took off at 8:34 a. m. EDT from Benson lake, where a party of 12 persons, including the boy's parents, lighted fires as a signal, as it was still dim in the mountains at that hour. He spotted the

Confesses Killing, Raping Aged Aunt

Indianapolis Man Held In Missouri

Portageville, Mo., Aug. 4. — (UP) — A 25-year-old Indianapolis man who admitted killing and raping his 70-year-old aunt was held at an undisclosed jail today for safekeeping.

Police chief Joe Moore said no outbreak of violence against the confessed slayer, Orville Underwood, was expected but that he had moved the prisoner to another jail "as a precaution."

Underwood admitted killing his aunt, Mrs. J. W. Hendrix, Monday when he became angry because she refused him money, according to Moore.

Underwood told police he had gone to his aunt's house with a companion, Robert Berry, 25, Hayti, Mo., in quest of money. When she refused, he became angry and ordered Berry out of the house.

Then, he told Moore, he beat his aunt on the head with a knife-sharpening stone, strangled her with a venetian blind cord and raped her twice.

He and Berry were arrested at Hayti. Berry was held, but Moore said there were no charges filed against him.

Moore said that Underwood admitted taking \$2.40 from his aunt's purse after he killed her.

Mrs. Hendrix had rented out rooms in her modest frame house to obtain her only income.

Roger Luginbill To New Mexico School

Berne, Aug. 4. — Roger Lee Luginbill, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Luginbill, of Berne, has accepted a position to teach in the Roswell, N. M., schools during the coming year. He will teach general science to the students of the ninth grade. He is a veteran of World War II and a graduate of Indiana University. He will move his wife and son to Roswell, a city of 13,000, in the near future.

ORDINANCE

Short Title: An Ordinance Prohibiting the parking of vehicles in certain areas in the City of Decatur, Indiana.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Decatur, Indiana, to-wit:

Section 1. For the purpose of this ordinance the word "vehicle" shall mean any device in, upon or by which any person or property is or may be transported upon a highway except a device which is operated upon rails or tracks.

Section 2. It is hereby prohibited and a violation of this ordinance for any person, persons, firm or corporation to park any vehicle, or cause to be parked any vehicle, in or upon the following described areas situated in the City of Decatur, Indiana, to-wit:

a. On the south side or portion of Monroe Street from Eighth to Thirteenth Streets in said City;

b. On the east side or portion of North Sixth Street from Monroe Street to Nuttman Ave. in said City;

c. On the east side or portion of South Sixth Street from Jefferson to Madison Streets in said City;

d. On the north side or portion of Adams Street from the alley between Eleventh and Twelfth Streets to Thirteenth Street in said City, or stated another way:

On the north side or portion of Adams Street for one and one-half blocks east of Thirteenth Street in said City.

Section 3. Any person, persons, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall upon conviction be fined any sum not to exceed Fifty Dollars (\$50.00).

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its adoption by the Common Council of said City, its approval by the Mayor of said City, and publication for two weeks successively in a newspaper of general circulation printed and published in the City of Decatur, Indiana.

20 Are Overcome By Chlorine Gas Cloud

Blame Faulty Valve At Swimming Pool

Los Angeles, Aug. 4. — (UP) — A faulty valve was blamed today for letting loose a cloud of chlorine gas that overcame 17 children and three adults among 100 swimmers at a pool near here.

Many of the children were knocked out in the water when the gas swept over the pool. Five lifeguards and a number of parents dived in to rescue them.

Officials said the valve, which filtered the gas into the pool to purify the water, jammed and caused the line to explode.

Eight victims were treated at Van Nuys receiving hospital. Two were listed as in serious condition. Twelve children were revived at the pool without being hospitalized.

Most seriously stricken was Norma MacDonald, 10, Pasadena, Cal., an asthma sufferer and Charles C. Witt, 29, San Pablo, Cal., who dived into the gas-covered pool to save his son, Charles, 7, and daughter Donna, 2.

Completes Private Flight Course Here

John Rogers, manager of the Liniger airport, reports that Robert Railing, an employee of the Citizens Telephone company, has completed his private flight course under the G. I. bill of rights. As soon as it is approved, Mr. Railing will continue his training for a commercial pilot license.

Mr. Rogers also states that the new sign recently installed on the roof of the Bag Service with the letters of Decatur, Indiana, in 15-foot tall and 2-foot wide letters was instrumental in aiding a pilot who wanted to land at the local airport.

Logansport, Ind., Aug. 4. — (UP) — Members of the international ladies garment workers union (AFL), on strike against the H. W. Gossard corset co., since May 24, met today to vote on a strike-ending agreement reached last night.

The ILGWU pickets at the Gossard plants here and in Huntington were withdrawn last night for the first time since the strike began.

and the elimination of animals for some experiments in polio.

3.—Disclosing how the virus attacks and feeds on the living cell.

4.—Isolation of virus as a possible aid to diagnosis.

The work indicated that the virus, a parasite, feeds on human tissue other than nerve cells. Such might explain why polio virus can be found in healthy persons without outward symptoms.

In the experiments here, the Harvard scientists obtained their virus—known as the Lansing Strain—from infected mice or monkeys. It is placed in a fluid made up of salt, serum of ox blood, penicillin, streptomycin, and minced human tissue.

The penicillin and streptomycin are used to destroy any bacteria that may have been in the tissue and thus sterilize the fluid without affecting the virus. The ox blood and salt serve as food for the tissue cells, keeping them alive so that the virus can in turn feed and multiply upon the tissue.

The scientists have kept the human tissue alive for as long as 49 days, and within 20 days the polio virus has multiplied itself by 5,400 times in the fluid alone, a "production" of virus that merely represents the overflow from the main growth going on in the tissue cells.

Development of the new technique here may bring about more rapid strides in the search for a safe vaccine against polio. For the first time it now appears that ultimately scientists will be able to produce virus in large quantities, free from brain or nervous tissue which has been known to result in serious complications in vaccine material for other diseases.

The experiments are continuing with other types of polio virus and other human and non-human tissue slated for investigation. Eventually, the scientists may find that polio virus can be grown in the embryonic egg, using tissue culture as a starting growth.

In many other diseases, vaccines have been developed largely because the disease organism could be grown in large quantities in test tube or egg incubation.

Mendy told police that he had stopped for a bicycle and McClure, in passing, struck the rear of Mendy's car. Police estimated the damage at \$20.

The Rev. Arthur R. Morris, Lawrenceburg, told the sheriff's office that he lost control of his car when he swerved to avoid striking a truck parked along the highway. Morris was driving on U. S. highway 27, seven miles south of Decatur when the accident happened. The car went through a fence and struck a utility pole. The sheriff estimated the damage to the car at \$250 and to the fence and pole at \$35.

Indianapolis, Aug. 4. — (UP) — Marshall E. Hanley, city attorney of Muncie and former president of the young Democrats of Indiana, was named today as a trustee of the Fort Wayne state school.

Governor Schricker appointed Hanley, who has been mentioned prominently as a possible federal attorney for the southern Indiana district, to fill the term of the late Earl D. Leas, Waterloo. The term expires in July, 1951.

Berne Man Observes His 101st Birthday

Berne, Aug. 4. — Christian C. Hirsch, Berne's oldest citizen, the oldest person in Adams county and one of the oldest in the state, Wednesday celebrated his 101st birthday. A family dinner at home featured the event. He has two daughters, Rosa, who keeps house for him, and Mrs. Walter Luginbill, of Fort Wayne. He was born west of Berne August 3, 1848, and has spent his entire life in this area. Despite his age, he is still surprisingly spry and walks up-town daily. He still eats well and appears stronger than when he reached the century mark one year ago.
