### Vice President On Flight To St. Louis

Washington, Aug. 8—(UP)—Vice president Alben W. Barkley took his attractive St. Louis widow "friend" to the baseball game in the Missouri city yesterday. And his pals here wished they knew the score on something besides the ball game.

They said that for all they knew, the 71-year-old widower flew 150 miles from his Paducah, Ky., home to St. Louis just to see the St. Louis Cardinals beat the New York Giants.

But they said they doubted it. Even though Barkley isn't talking much, they said, his statements to the week with evangelist D. E. Wilson of Covington, Va., leading the devotions. "The Cardinals look good," Barkley told them. "Who's in first place anyway."

"This is the second game I've seen this year and I enjoyed it immensely."

After the game, he had a big dinner at the swank Bellerive Country Club. Then he drove to the airport to fly back to Washington. Reporters asked him if he would return to St. Louis soon.

"I've been coming to St. Louis ever since I was a boy," he said. "My daughter formerly lived here. I've been coming to St. Louis for this and other attractions."

And how, they persisted, does Mrs. Hadley rate among these attractions? They reminded him rumors are flying.

"Rumors are always flying," he said. "I find Mrs. Hadley a very charming and lovely woman and she has very nice friends. I enjoy being with them."
