

## Marion Bartender Critically Wounded

### Marion Man Is Shot In Brawl At Tavern

Marion, Ind., Aug. 10. — (UP) — A bartender was in critical condition today after being shot in a tavern brawl.

Tavern owner Newton Jones signed a statement that he shot James E. Israel, 38, as the latter fought with Jones' brother, Dillard, in the tavern late yesterday, police said.

Dillard Jones told authorities the brawl started out as a fight between two waitresses, Nancy Dalton and Mildred Welch. He said he tried to break it up, but that Israel also got into the fracas.

Newton Jones, who said he was on his way out of his restaurant, said he turned around when he saw the fight, grabbed his .38 caliber revolver and fired one shot at Israel. The bullet struck him in the side.

Israel was rushed to a hospital and was operated on and given five blood transfusions. Physicians said he was in "very critical" condition.

Jones was arrested on an open charge. Cause of the brawl was not determined.

## Aged Elkhart Man Is Killed In Fall

Elkhart, Ind., Aug. 10. — (UP) — Byron C. Godfrey, 94, died yesterday from injuries received in a fall at his home Sunday. He was a retired civic leader.

## Falls From Ladder, Painter Is Killed

Shirley, Ind., Aug. 10. — (UP) — Funeral services will be held tomorrow for Jasper H. Wicker, 72, who died from a broken neck received when he fell from a ladder while painting a barn on the June Casey farm near Kennard.

## Man Is Arrested On Paternity Charge

Bernard Eyanson, 26, Sixteenth street, was arrested on a bench warrant by sheriff Herman Bowman, the warrant charging paternity. Eyanson is being held in jail pending a time set for his trial.

The sheriff also arrested Eugene W. Eweld, Wapakoneta, O., who was charged with passing while in a danger zone on highway 33. Eweld was later tried in justice of the peace court and fined \$5 and costs totalling \$15.75.

## Seized For Murder Of 25 Years Ago

### Brown County Man Is Under Arrest

Franklin, Ind., Aug. 10. — (UP) — A Brown county man who police said turned from committing burglaries to becoming an artist, was in custody today in connection with a murder a quarter century ago.

State police, deputy sheriffs and officers from the Indianapolis detective's bureau, arrested Ralph Lee, 51, at his home near Peoga last night. Police said Lee was wanted for the murder of Abner Peek, a grocer. Peek was shot to death during a robbery in July, 1924.

Authorities said Lee, who has a crime record dating back to 1911, returned to Brown county and landscape painting after he was paroled from a federal prison in Springfield, Mo., three years ago. They said he was held there following one of his arrests.

Police said Lee was sought by local authorities in connection with the Peek slaying since his jail break 25 years ago while awaiting trial.

## Slight Increase For Livestock, Produce

Lafayette, Ind., Aug. 10. — (UP) — Hoosier farmers received slightly more for their livestock and produce in July than they did in June, according to a report from Purdue University and federal statisticians. Prices did not closely follow usual seasonal trends. Hogs and whole milk rose more than expected but cattle, egg and corn prices went up less than expected. Wheat, chicken, oat and apple prices dropped more than anticipated. Calves went up instead of staying the same.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Aug. 10. — (UP) — The 2,200-seat News-Sentinel outdoor theater will be dedicated tonight, accompanied by the strains of the Fort Wayne Philharmonic orchestra.
