### Back To Work Move Reported In Finland

Helsinki, Finland, Aug. 22. — (UP) — Government officials said today that a back-to-work movement was growing among Finland's 150,000 strikers despite communist efforts to keep the country paralyzed with a general strike.

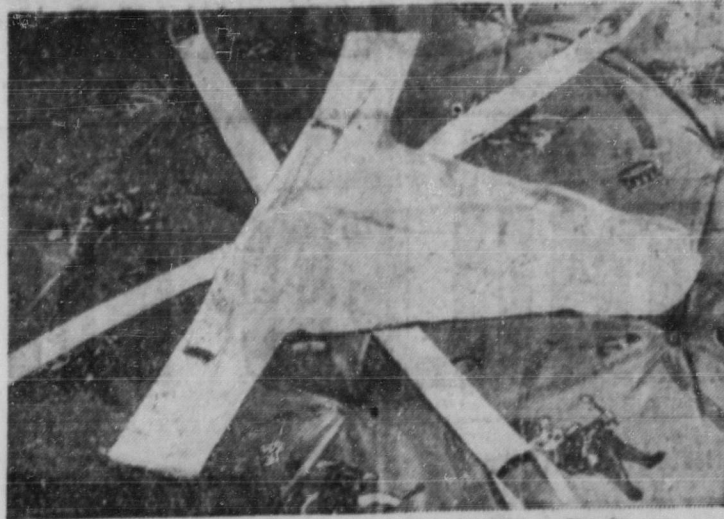
Several groups among the strikers have voted to return to work, including building trades workers who form the largest single group in the country-wide strike, officials said.

More than 23,000 of some 25,000 striking lumbermen in northern Finland have voted against the strike, a socialist union official said, but it was not known when they planned to return to their jobs.

McDonald announced that he plans to seek an autopsy on the body of Dearing.

Mrs. Spurlock told police that she and her husband, Arleigh, were driving to Hot Springs, Ark., where Spurlock planned to take treatments for arthritis. The husband was held only briefly, and was reported so upset that he could sign only an "X" to police records.

turer to find out whether he helped write anonymous papers criticizing air force bomber purchasing. Brooks said the plane builder — whom he refused to name — would be subpoenaed if there were no other way to learn the sources of the mysterious charges.

Five Percenters — Sen. Karl E. Mundt, R., S. D., said information from a young veteran may prove important in the senate's "five percent" investigation. Mundt refused, however, to identify the ex-GI or to reveal the nature of his evidence.

China — Four senators denounced the administration's China policy and demanded immediate U. S. military aid for the Nationalist government. The attack was carried in a 19-page reply to the state department's recent white paper on China. It was signed by Sens. Pat McCarran, D., Nev. Styles Bridges, R., N. H., Kenneth S. Wherry, R., Neb., and William F. Knowland, R., Cal.

Education — Rep. Tom Steed promised to supply "fireworks" at the house labor committee "round-table discussion" of federal aid-to-education scheduled today.

Farm — The senate agriculture committee opened public hearings on new farm legislation amid charges that the Brannan farm play would lead the nation into a depression.

Unification — Chairman Millard E. Tydings, D., Md., of the senate armed services committee said defense secretary Louis Johnson is taking steps to save up to \$3,000,000 a day in the military establishment. Johnson hopes to achieve the economies under new powers granted him in the tightened unification law.

"They are our friends and they are friends worth having. We must keep them our friends if the world is to be a decent place for our children and their children to live in."

"Many nations which share our Democratic values and our traditions are working with us," he said. "Without these allies in the cause of peace, our task would be hopeless. We can win a permanent peace only through the joint ef-

forts of free nations striving toward the same objectives."

Mr. Truman said that while "the principles of the United Nations are still our goal" it became apparently shortly after the war that the UN "could not live up to all our hopes for it until all nations were united in the desire for peace."

For this reason, he said, the United States led the way by:

1. Approving aid to Greece and Turkey in 1947 which "preserved the integrity of both countries."
2. Initiating a program to aid 16 European nations in 1948 by adoption of the Marshall plan which

has "prevented general collapse in Europe."

3. Binding hemispheric ties in 1947 by signing the pact of Rio de Janeiro joining North and South American in a defensive alliance.

4. Signing the north Atlantic treaty "based on the principle that an armed attack on one member

nation is an attack on all."

Then he said the fifth step "is to back up this principle with military assistance to European nations, and to certain other nations, which are unable to build up their defenses without outside help."
