Wounded Gunman Is Nabbed At Capital

Tip By Bus Clerk Leads To Capture

Indianapolis, Aug. 30—(UP)—A wounded gunman was captured early today on a tip given police by a bus clerk who sold the man a ticket to Chicago, Ill.

Police picked up Percy Lee Harrison, 30, Evanston, Ill., as a suspect in the robbery of a filling station yesterday. They said he admitted he was wounded by the station operator, Orville Korn, but denied the robbery.

Yesterday a posse of state police, sheriff's deputies and city police arrested William Arnold, 27, also of Evanston, as he lay face down in the mud of a cornfield. Arnold and Harrison allegedly were accomplices in the gas station robbery.

Police credited ticket clerk William A. Masternik, 25, Indianapolis, with the capture of Harrison. They said Masternik sold the man a ticket to Chicago but became suspicious because of his bloodstained hand.

Masternik then offered Traveler's

insurance, and Harrison bought that, giving his name as Percy Harris and an Evanston address. The clerk remembered radio broadcasts that a wounded man sought for the holdup was from Evanston and called police.

Harrison surrendered without objection.

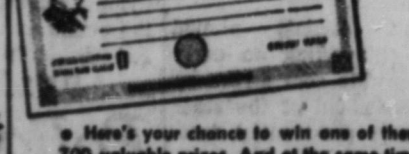
