Jesus and the Psalms

Lesson for September 11, 1949

SOME parts of the Old Testament Jesus never once mentioned. Others he quoted again and again. Could this be because some parts were more helpful to him than others? At any rate, the Psalms were one section of his Bible which he often quoted.

Worship

ONE USE Jesus made of the Psalms was in public worship. Whenever he went up to the Temple he would join in singing or in listening to the great choirs singing these ancient hymns. Many of our own best-loved hymns, while not direct translations, are based on Psalms. For example, "Still, still with Thee" is from Psalm 103; "God Is My Strong Salvation" from Psalm 27; "The King of Love" from Psalm 23; "O Worship the King" from Psalm 104. In private worship also we know Jesus used the Psalms. One of the Hebrew names for them was, "The Book of Psalms," and Jesus, like many another who has loved these Psalms, found in them the natural expression of what was deepest in his heart when he turned toward his Father in heaven.

A striking proof of this comes from the story of Calvary. The cry, "My God, why hast thou forsaken me?" is a quotation from Psalm 22:1, and "Into thy hands I commend my spirit" is from Psalm 31:5. Thus, two out of three prayers he uttered in his last moments were from the Psalms. So the reader today, pondering in a quiet moment these immortal poems, either from the printed book or better yet, as Jesus did, from the treasures of memory, may often find in them prayers which seem breathed from his own mind and to which he need only say, Amen.

Truth about God

JESUS also found in the Psalms a revelation of truth. It would be too much to say that Jesus derived his ideas of God from the Psalms. But certainly some of the great teachings about God which we hear from Jesus we can read already in the Psalms.

Jesus did not use the Psalms stupidly, of course. He would never have supposed that you could take just any sentence about God out of some Psalm or other, and quote it as the last word about God.

For instance, during his temptations the thought was suggested to him that he could jump off a high building and not be hurt; had not God promised just that in a Psalm? Now it is true that Psalm 91:1-2 does say that God will keep you from "dashing your foot against a stone" but Jesus knew that does not mean that God will guarantee to keep you out of trouble or harm no matter how foolish you are!

Christ in the Psalms

JESUS found in the Psalms also prophecies. There is a rather thin line between illustration and prophecy.

For instance, when the Jerusalem boys and girls were making such a noisy welcome for him, and the dignified priests were protesting, Jesus quoted Psalm 82 in defense of the children: "Out of the mouths of babes and sucklings thou hast perfected praise."

Did he mean that the Psalmist had predicted that very occasion, or did he mean that the Psalm expressed a truth always good.

At all events, we do know that Jesus often took a Psalm, or a part of one, as a prophetic picture of himself. He knew himself to be the true King of Mankind, "the Lord's Anointed," as his use of Psalm 110:1 plainly shows.

Yet he also knew that he must pass through suffering to his throne (Luke 24:26). When the leaders of his people rejected him he was not surprised, for he thought at once of Psalm 118:22-23. When he hung on the cross, and saw the soldiers gambling for his clothes, Psalm 22:16-18 would surely come into his mind.

And can we doubt that in his last agonies, one who knew the Psalms so well would not have remembered also the later lines from the same prophetic Psalm? It begins with the tragic question—Why? But it rises to a song of triumph—"When he cried unto him, he heard!"

Youth Cycles Through Soviet Iron Curtain

Peddles Leisurely Into Vienna Today

Vienna, Austria, Sept. 9—(UP)—A Brooklyn youth who "disappeared" into the Russian zone Monday peddled leisurely into Vienna today on a bicycle flying the American flag.

The arrival of Sidney Schwartz, 22, after a pleasant trip through the Soviet zone from Linz to Vienna set at rest an international incident threatening to boil over with ugly charges.

It also brought into the open what well may be the blithest passage through the iron curtain since Winston Churchill proclaimed that the Russians had draped it across Europe from the Baltic to the Adriatic.

Young Schwartz pumped a contented tourist's journey for 95 miles through the Soviet zone lying westward of Vienna without even knowing it was anything to get excited about.

Schwartz crossed the zonal border at the bridge over the Danube between Linz and Urfahr. Army authorities announced that a witness said he saw the youth being overpowered by a Russian sentry on the bridge and taken into a guardhouse.

As it turned out, when he crossed the bridge Schwartz was equipped with all the necessary travel papers, including a four-power gray pass authorizing travel through the Soviet zone. He got the pass in Switzerland.

His papers were checked by a Soviet sentry on the bridge. The sentry told him the papers were in good order. Just how the report of his being overpowered arose, the youth could not say.

He made his leisurely way to Vienna, unmolested by Russians or anyone else.

After his arrival he picked up the army newspaper Stars and Stripes and noticed that it reported an American missing in the Russian zone. Finally it dawned upon him that he was the victim. He rushed to the U. S. army provost marshal's office to set the records straight.

With much head-shaking and some initial disbelief, the army asked him some stern and searching questions. Finally convinced that his story was true, the military made it public and closed the case.

tirely" its efforts to avert "the strike."
The brotherhoods called the strike to enforce demands for settlement of 282 grievances growing out of interpretations of operating rules. The union said about \$3,000,000 was involved in the differences.

Postal authorities said that trucks will operate out of Kansas City, St. Louis, Little Rock, and other terminal points to provide "some mail each day" to the towns served exclusively by the road.

Burying Victims Of Fanatical Slayer

Youth Attempted To Seize Killer's Gun

Camden, N. J., Sept. 9—(UP)—The Cramer Hill residential section, where fanatic Howard Unruh ran amok killing 13 persons and wounding three others, began burying its dead today.

Police lines were formed around the home where funeral services will be held this afternoon for six-year-old Orris Smith, shot to death while sitting on a hobby-horse getting his pre-school haircut.

Two other victims of Unruh's mad shooting spree were to be buried after services in nearby communities. John J. Pilarchik, 27-year-old cobbler, will be buried from a funeral home at Pennsauken while services will be held in Woodbury for Alvin M. Day, Jr., 24.

Seven victims will be buried tomorrow. But services for Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Cohen and his mother, Mrs. Minnie Cohen were postponed until Monday to await the arrival of the Cohen's son, Leonard, 18, enroute home by plane from his army station in Japan.

While neighbors gathered to pay their last respects, Armond Harrie, 16, one of the three persons who survived Unruh's 20-minute homicidal orgy, told how he tried to wrest the gun off the killer.

The boy said Unruh stormed into the kitchen of his home and emptied the gun at him and his mother, wounding both in the arm.

"He turned the gun around and held it by the barrel and tried to hit me with it," Harrie said. "That's when I knew it was empty. As he turned and went out I grabbed for his gun. I got hold of the gun by the butt, but tripped over the chair. Then he ran out of the house."

Armond was released from Cooper hospital yesterday after treatment for a flesh wound in his arm.

"will not sign any other loyalty pledge differing in form and content" from that pledge.

The Catholic version read: "I hereby promise as a faithful citizen to remain loyal to the Republic of Czechoslovakia, to undertake nothing that would be against her interests, security and sovereignty. Faithfully I shall fulfill my duties as a priest and shall do my best to take an active part in all reconstruction efforts aiming to achieve the greatest prosperity of all Czechs and Slovaks."

Meantime, the church-state dispute widened with a series of late

developments, including:
1. The reported Czech refusal to grant a visa to the new Papal Nuncio, Rt. Rev. Msgr. Paolo Bertoli of Berne.
Bertoli was to have replaced Rt. Rev. Msgr. Genaro Verolini who left here July 12 when the Communists accused him of "grave interference" in internal affairs.
2. The naming of three new Catholic bishops without government consent during the last month.
3. Government preparations to enact within the month a new bill giving the state almost complete control over the clergy.
4. Church protests against the bill, including a declaration by priests that "with the consent of all the bishops" the priests "do not accept" the bill.
