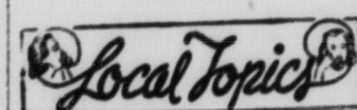
### Michigan Pastor To Be Special Speaker

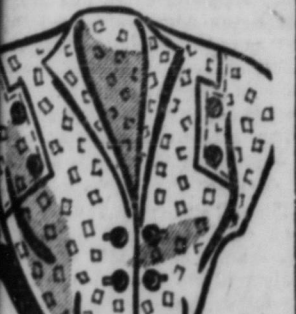
