Attend Methodist Day Of Evangelism

Decatur Methodists Attend Conference

1,200 Indiana Methodist laymen will attend the Methodist day of evangelism at the First Methodist church, Anderson, Wednesday. Dr. Gerald H. Jones, pastor of First Methodist church of this city, Fred Busche, lay leader for the Fort Wayne district, Fred Mills, Miss Etta Mallonee, and W. F. Beery will be in attendance.

This meeting will be one of the three conference days of evangelism that will bring together 5,000 key Indiana Methodist evangelistic leaders. The meetings will be held at First Methodist church, Bloomington, First Methodist church, Anderson, and Trinity Methodist church, Lafayette.

The days of evangelism will launch an evangelistic advance in Methodist churches of Indiana under the slogan, "Each One Reach One for Christ and His Church."

Bishop Richard C. Raines, resident bishop of the Indiana area of the church, will preside at the day long meetings.

Heading the list of speakers will be Dr. Ralph Difendorfer, president of the Japan International Christian university foundation, New York, Dr. Harry Denman, executive secretary of the department of evangelism of the Methodist church, Nashville, and Dr. Hugh Stuntz, president of Scarritt college, Nashville.

Dr. A. P. Shirkey, Houston, Texas, will be the featured speaker at the evening services. Dr. Shirkey will speak on the theme of "Witness Indiana For Christ and His Church."

Bishop Raines will speak at the afternoon session on "Methodism's strategic peculiarity," Methodism's stand on the use of alcoholic beverages.

The days of evangelism will emphasize both visitation and preaching evangelism.

For the next eight months Indiana Methodist pastors will preach evangelistic sermons on "Our Faith."

Methodist laymen will study each month on the same themes. They are: November, "Our Faith in God;" December, "Our Faith in Christ;" January, "Our Faith in the Bible;" February, "Our Faith in Love;" March, "Our Faith in Prayer;" April, "Our Faith in Immortality;" May, "Our Faith in the Holy Spirit;" and June, "Our Faith in the Kingdom of God."

The Rev. L. G. Jacobs, Alexandria, is chairman of the evangelism committee of the North Indiana conference.

Chest X-rays For 300,000 Hoosiers

Indianapolis, Nov. 14. —(UP)—Nearly 300,000 Hoosiers underwent chest X-ray examinations last year and the tests revealed 322 cases of active T.B. the Indiana Tuberculosis association announced today.

The surveys were made in 73 of the state's 92 counties by eight mobile X-ray units.

In addition to the active cases, 123 cases of "questionable active" character and 162 cases suspected to be T-B were found, according to Murray A. Auerbach, executive secretary of the association.
