It will do no good for the Church to preach a diluted Gospel of morality and goodness; the Gospel which Christ preached was one of personal salvation through faith in His redeeming blood.

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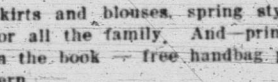
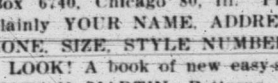
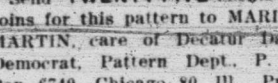
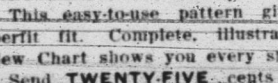
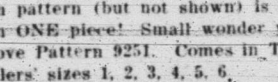
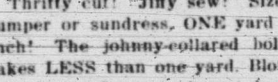
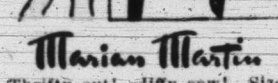
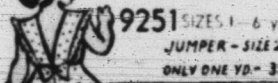
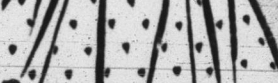
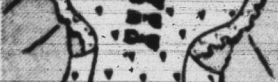
