Capt. James Glendenning Claims German Girl As Bride In Ceremony Here Thursday

Lillian Reedel, recently of Germany, and Capt. James Glendenning of the U. S. army, were wed in a private ceremony in the Zion Lutheran church here Thursday. The wedding climaxed years of waiting, months of cutting red tape, and added an international touch to local weddings.

The new Mrs. Glendenning arrived in Indiana only Tuesday following about six months of waiting for her visa. Through the sponsorship of Mr. and Mrs. Milo B. Glendenning of Hartford township, parents of the groom, and the resettlement service of the National Lutheran conference, it was possible to bring her to this country.

The Rev. Edgar P. Schmidt officiated during the simple but impressive rites. The bride wore a casually but smartly tailored light grey suit with black accessories and complemented her attire with a pink hat with matching veil. Her corsage was of roses.

Capt. Glendenning is a graduate of West Point, class of 1943, and served with the ninety-first division in Italy during the war, where, at one time, he was reported missing in action.

Following the war, the captain was stationed in Augsburg, Germany, with the military constabulary. Mrs. Glendenning had moved there during the post-war flux, when movements of large groups of humanity from one place to another was the popular thing. Originally her home was in Estonia, now a part of Russia's world.

Capt. and Mrs. Glendenning left today for Birmingham, Ala., where he is stationed with an ROTC unit. The couple plan to make their home there.
