Thy Rebuke Hath Broken His Heart; Behold, and See If There Be Any Sorrow; He Was Cut off

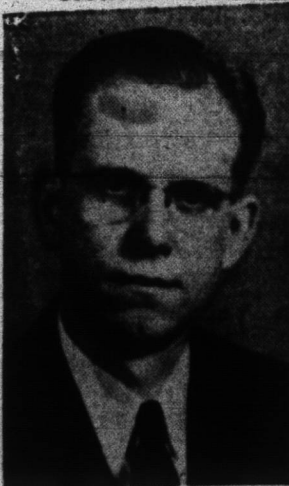

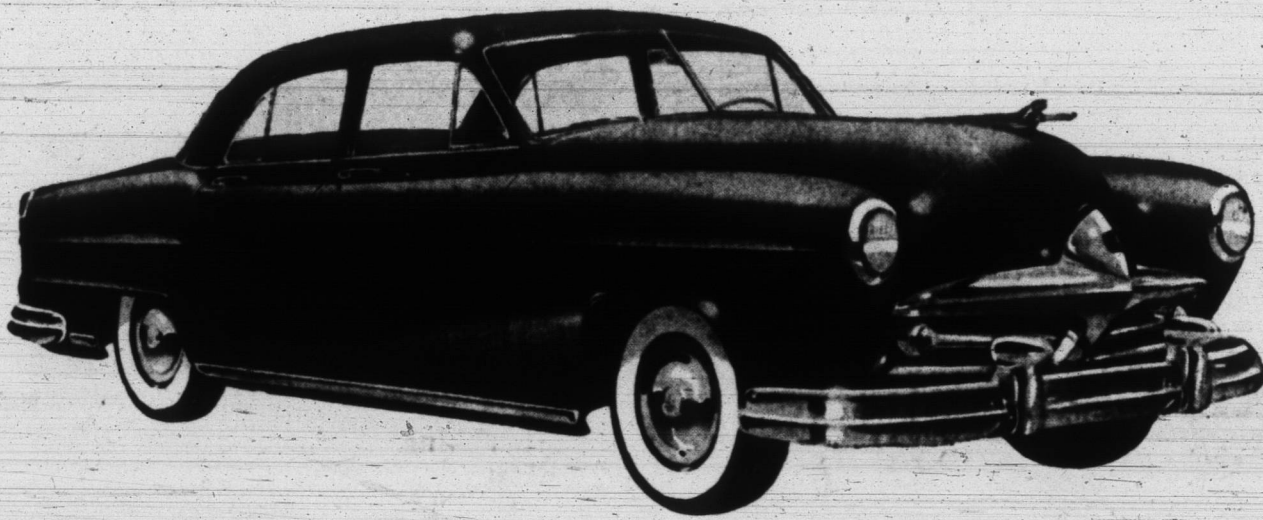
