

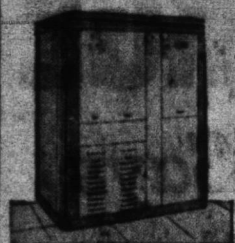
Auburn Men Killed As Auto Hits Truck

Dr. Sander Before Medical Board Today

Doctor's Career At Stake At Hearing
Concord, N. H., Apr. 12.—(UP)—Dr. Hermann N. Sander was expected to testify today before the New Hampshire medical board of registration at a hearing where his career will be at stake.

The board will gather evidence to determine whether to revoke the license of the 41-year-old Candia physician who was acquitted of first degree murder last month in the alleged "mercy death" of a woman cancer patient. Dr. Sander, who has not practiced since January, was expected to appear with one of his attorneys of his own volition, since the board only has said he may appear if he wishes.

It was believed the general practitioner has been waiting to explain his actions in the case of the late Mrs. Abbie C. Norro, 59, a Manchester patient, doomed to die of incurable cancer.

The board sought to determine whether Dr. Sander was a person "whose moral character or personal habits are such as to unfit him for the practice of medicine" in the state.

Outcome of the closed meeting will not be known immediately, however, since Dr. John S. Wheeler, secretary of the board, said the final decision will be made only after "due consideration" of the evidence.

Examinations Listed Under Civil Service

The United States civil service commission today announced different examinations for engineers and laborers, the latter positions to be filled in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky. The engineer examinations, for all branches of engineering, are for positions in Washington, D.C.

The salaries for the laborer jobs, including janitor for duty in various federal agencies, range from

\$2,150 to \$2,674 annually; engineers from \$4,600 to \$4,400. Those qualifying for the engineer's examination must have completed a four year engineering course plus from two to four years of professional experience.
