ENTERTAIN WITH BRIDAL SHOWER

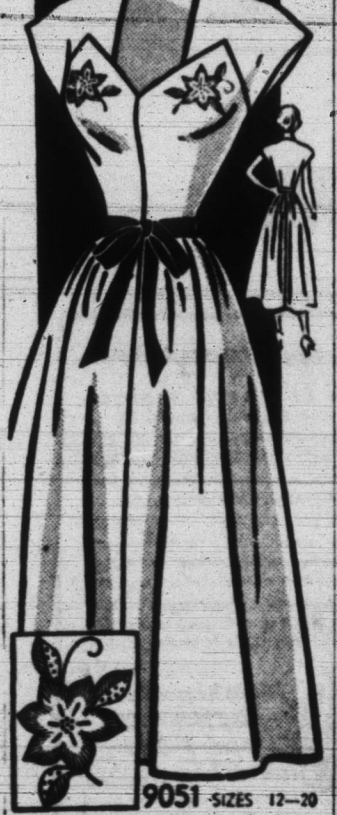
