

## New Price Increases Are Reported Today

### Warning Echoed By Business Leaders

New price increases were reported today as business leaders echoed President Truman's warning that profiteering and scare-buying might bring on rationing and price control.

The fresh boosts came in the food, petroleum and steel industries.  
Bakeries at Milwaukee, Wis., and Shreveport, La., increased bread prices. They pointed to higher prices for flour and other ingredients.

Standard Oil of Kentucky boosted the wholesale price of gasoline four-tenths of a cent per gallon, and Pennsylvania grade crude oil was hiked 14 cents a barrel, the third increase this year.

At Pittsburgh, Superior Steel Corp. upped prices on stainless steel products 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 cents a pound.

The U. S. wholesale grocers association cautioned housewives to avoid hoarding because it creates unnecessary momentary shortages. Chicago's State Street council said there are plenty of consumer goods to take care of demand for "some time to come."

"Hoarding is absolutely unnecessary," President Randall H. Cooper of the council said.

The Illinois Chamber of Commerce advised its members to continue "business as usual" instead of hastening to stock up on items or hoarding prices.

In his address to the nation last night, President Truman cautioned against scare buying, hoarding and other steps which would force up retail prices. He bluntly condemned "profiteers."

A West Los Angeles poultry manufacturer and retailer, A. A. Sanderson, reported that women were hustling to get chicken stock-ings, with sales about 400 percent

above normal.  
The Michigan liquor commission ordered \$2,500,000 worth of hard-to-get whiskey to forestall any possible scarcity.

The Wyoming liquor commission said it has been receiving "war scare orders" but has had no pronounced run on state stocks.

Frank A. D. Andrea, president of the Andrea Radio Corp., said at New York that an all-out war effort would cause a shortage of television sets because electronic parts would be diverted to military use.

In Muncie, Ind., president Edmund F. Ball of Ball Brothers fruit jar manufacturing company said housewives are doing more home canning this summer and therefore using more jars and lids.

He said many women are turning to home canning "as a means of assuring future food supplies and as a stopgap against rising food costs."
