

Six Adams County Boys Rank Well At Conservation Camp

Rudy Meyer, member of the public relations and educational staff of the state conservation department, reported today that the six Adams county boys who attended conservation camps sponsored by the state conservation department the last two weeks ranked high at both camps.

Three Adams county boys attended Camp Kosciusko near Warsaw the week of July 24. They were Allen Grote, Union township; Vernon Thieme, Union township; and Larry Bollenbacher, Wabash township. Grote received the highest grade of any boy in the camp on a final examination held just prior to the closing of the camp. Both of the other Adams county

boys also ranked high in the grading. Jerry Augsburger, Hartford township; Willis Bulmahn, Preble township; and John Frank, Union township, attended the state conservation camp at Versailles the week of July 17. Meyer accompanied these young men to the camp and remained a day. He reported that all three ranked above average in the final rating. The camps are part of the expanded conservation program in the state which also includes the teaching of conservation in schools and the showing of timely motion pictures in connection with the conservation program.

Special evening entertainment at the 4-H club fair will include Al Stewart, Purdue's music director, leading group singing Wednesday night, August 9. It was announced today.

Stewart accompanied the Indiana Home Economics choruses to Washington, D. C. last month and directed them when they performed. Next Wednesday at 9-15 p. m. he will also lead the Adams county home economics chorus at the 4-H fair while they sing three numbers.

A full night program is planned for each of the three nights of the fair. Monday night's program will start at 6:30 o'clock with a big parade through Monroe, led by the 4-H band and the 4-H accordion band.

The parade is under the direction of Doyle Rich and Lee Parrish, both of Monroe. Each 4-H club, and there are more than 30 in the county, is invited to enter a float; cash prizes will be awarded to all who enter. Clubs who do not enter a float will form marching units, and will also be awarded prizes based on marching, placards, and costumes.

Acts On Stage
The county entertainment festival, which includes local talent winners from each of the county's townships, will perform from a stage built behind the Monroe school. These acts will appear Monday and Tuesday nights at 8 o'clock.

Tuesday night's program will open at 6 o'clock with a real water battle. Later, 4-H members will be allowed to don firemen's uniforms and battle among themselves.

Livestock Sale
Wednesday night the 4-H club pigs and beef calves will be sold after judging. Ned Johnson, local auctioneer, is lining up a group of county auctioneers who will sell the club animals.

Also Wednesday night, will be the 4-H style show, where 4-H girls will model their own dresses and aprons from the stage. Before the show, which starts at 8:30 o'clock, Al Stewart will be introduced, and will lead group singing. After the style show the home economics chorus will sing three songs.

Bloomington Plant Workers On Strike

Bloomington, Ind., Aug. 2. —(UP)—More than 2,700 employees of the RCA-Victor manufacturing plant were on strike today over negotiation of a new contract. Picket lines were set up yesterday, the day after the company's contract with union electrical workers union, local 1424, expired.

The issue was wages, union spokesmen said. The plant produces radio and television equipment. Salaried employees and supervisory officials were allowed to cross the picket lines today, but workers were barred.
