

Peter A. Habegger Dies This Morning

Funeral Services Sunday Afternoon

Peter A. Habegger, 80, retired farmer and former Monroe township assessor, died at 1:45 o'clock this morning at his home in Berne following a year's illness.

He was born in Canton Bern, Switzerland, Oct. 12, 1871, a son of Abraham M. and Lena Moser-Habegger, but had lived in Adams county since he was four years old. His wife, the former Anna Neuen-schwander, died in 1939.

He was a member of the First Mennonite church.

Surviving are five sons, Andrew, Clinton and Sylvan, all of Berne; Arley and Milo of near Berne; three daughters, Mrs. Fred Nussbaum of near Monroe, and Mrs. Albert Lehman and Mrs. Dale Johnson of near Berne; 23 grandchildren; 21 great-grandchildren; four brothers, Menno, Eli, Robert and Jacob, all of Berne, and one sister, Mrs. Benhart Lehman of Berne.

Funeral services will be held at 1 p.m. Sunday at the First Mennonite church, the Rev. Olin A. Krebiel officiating. Burial will be in the MRE cemetery. The body will be removed from the Yager funeral home to the residence, where friends may call after 7 o'clock this evening.

It carried out would seriously compromise the security of the middle east.

It described the move as a "new pretext for the presence of British forces in Egypt."

The communique said Egypt is "natural guardian" of the Suez Canal because it passes through Egyptian territory.

"It is Egypt's concern, more than that of anyone else, to maintain the freedom of that waterway," the communique said.

Pet's lifetime production to date amounts to, in 4072 days of milking, 161,174 pounds of milk and 5405.2 pounds of butterfat. This would equal approximately \$5,587 quarts of milk and 6,216 pounds of butter. Her profit above feed cost was \$3,202.52, which is a pretty good income for its owner.

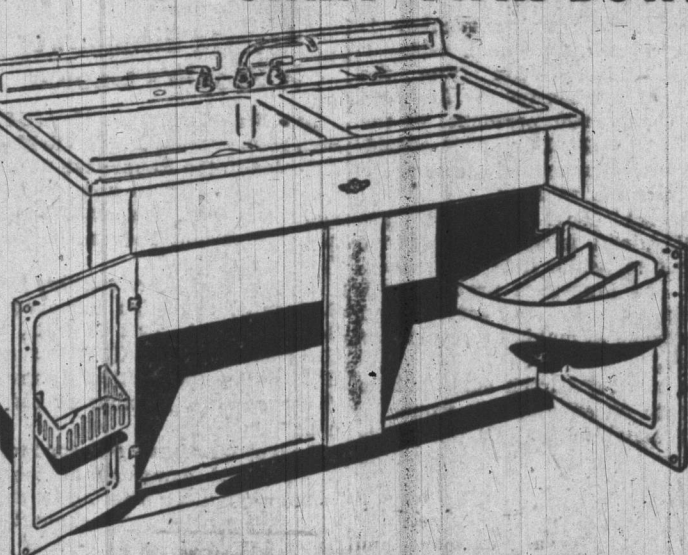

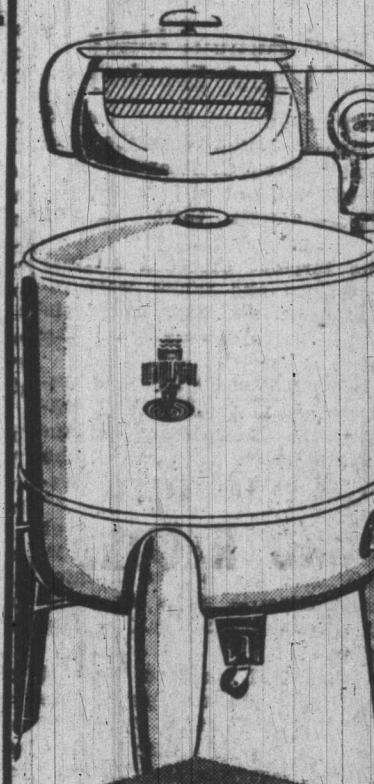

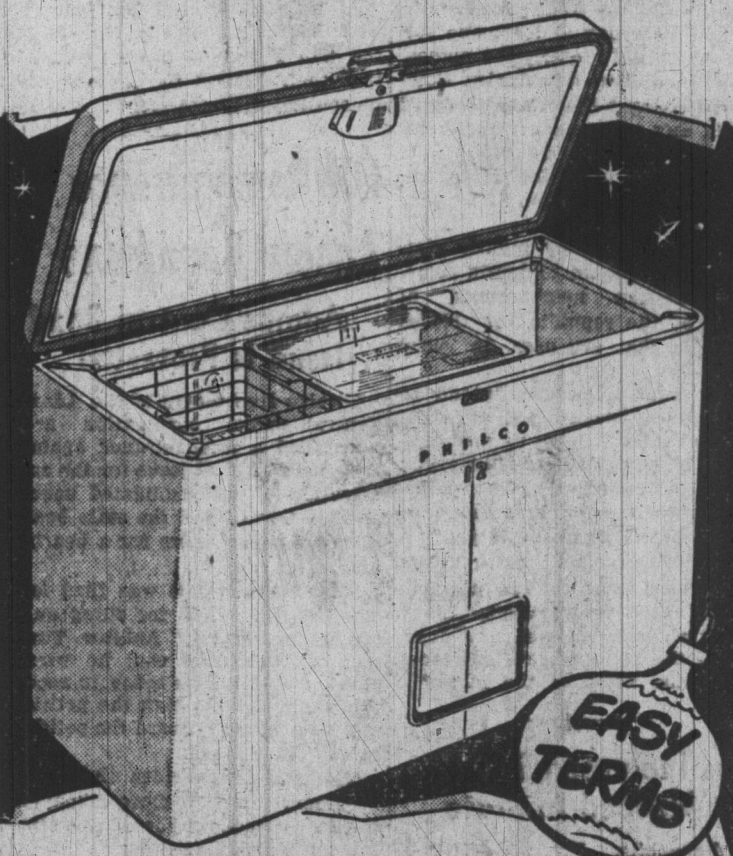
