The drizzles have given way to sunshine and now everything is in tune with the beautiful month of May.

The way some of the college students are acting, you would think that they never heard of a boy having a sister.

The 110-year-old civil war veteran who pinned on a "I like Ike" button is truly an optimist by planning to vote in November.

By a vote of 52 to 18, the U. S. Senate approved the appointment of James P. McGranery of Philadelphia as Attorney General. A bitter fight was made against the jurist, but among the 14 Republicans who voted for the Democrat nominee were Senators Duff and Martin of McGranery's home state. Their vote is an added endorsement of McGranery's qualifications for the cabinet post.

The Red prisoners of war held by the United States on Kojima Island do not know when they are well off. It stands to reason that they are fairly treated and are provided ample food. The hard-shelled Communists are causing the trouble and no doubt have stooges planted in the compounds to start riots and rebellions. The suggestion that the POW's be moved to Okinawa seems to be a sensible solution of the trouble, for there they would be too far to get to any mainland and would require less guarding.

The newest ship launched in this country is the United States superliner, built for passenger service across the Atlantic. In nautical lingo, she will carry 2,000 passengers, but in case of war can be converted to a troop ship with accommodations for 14,000 men. She will outrun any submarine and can travel from San Francisco to Asia and back without refueling. In her bigness the designers streamlined the queen of the seas so she could pass through the Panama Canal. We hope she doesn't meet the fate of the Normandie.

The removal of parking meters along Monroe street and setting back parking lines at the First, Second and Third street crossings, follows a recommendation of the Indiana state highway commission. Clearing these crossings of cars will give better visibility to the traffic lanes and should eliminate the chance of accident, the state highway engineers explain. It will be a violation to park too close to the corners and new yellow lines will be placed along the curbing, to designate the lawful parking areas.

In his speech at West Point Military Academy's 150th anniversary, President Truman said the Communists might renew a full scale war in Korea, in view of the breakdown in truce negotiations. For nearly a year, the American representatives have been carrying on truce talks and most of the problems were solved, except the demand to turn over about 80,000 former Communists to be butchered by the Reds. The President implied that this country and allied nations would not overlook the use of new atomic weapons on the Korean front, if the Communists want to fight it out. In that plan, the West Pointers and other citizens would agree.

Exercise in moderation is good for most people but overexertion can be dangerous and is often fatal. The American Heart Association warns those it calls "vacation athletes" against the danger of participating in violent exercise after long periods of inactivity. Most persons hate to admit that they are less capable of athletic endeavor than they once were. But the individual who spends most of his week at a desk and then takes to the golf course, tennis courts or beach with abandoned energy is inviting trouble. No intelligent person would operate a machine beyond the point of its endurance or without giving proper attention to its maintenance. The human body, the most complicated machinery in the world, deserves the same careful treatment.

North Carolina Vote Is Sought By Russell

Taft Backer Claims 78 Percent Of Need

Washington, May 22 — (UP) — Sen. Richard B. Russell of Georgia counted on North Carolina to provide him with a big bloc of Democratic convention delegates today but Florida campaign problems kept him worried.

North Carolina Democrats were scheduled to name 40 national convention delegates with 32 votes—the second largest southern delegation — at today's state convention.

Before leaving to resume his Florida campaign, Russell told reporters that he expects to get the support of a substantial majority of the North Carolina delegation, although it may be officially "un-instructed."

The campaign organization of Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, another candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, also claimed support in North Carolina but did not expect to win a majority.

On the Republican side, Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio headed into South Dakota to campaign for votes in the June 3 primary. It will be Taft's last primary test and his only remaining pre-convention race against Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, his chief rival for the GOP presidential nomination. David S. Ingalls, Taft's campaign manager, said in a statement that the Ohioan now has 474 delegates, or 78 percent of the 604 needed for the nomination. The United Press tabulation of instructed and publicly committed delegates gave Taft 386 and Eisenhower 360.

Ingalls also said Eisenhower had made "the biggest blunder" of the campaign by saying at Oslo, "if the people want me for president, they will know where to find me." Eisenhower's headquarters in Paris announced he will turn over his command of European defense forces to Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway on May 30 and take off for home May 31. He is due in Washington June 1 where he will report to President Truman and then return to civilian clothes.

A newsmagazine poll of 50 leading political writers in Washington showed that 35 of them think Eisenhower will get the Republican nomination and 11 think it will go to Taft. Three guessed the GOP nominee will be Gov. Earl Warren of California, and one said it will be Sen. Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois.

On the Democratic side, seven persons were mentioned. There were 20 guesses for Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois, 17 for Kefauver, seven for vice president Alban Barkley, three for mutual security director W. Averell Harriman, and one each for Eisenhower, Russell, and Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson.

Confesses Part In \$100,000 Stickup

Spent Most Of Loot On Night Club Singer

New York, May 22 — (UP) — A mild-mannered young gunsmith said today he went on a \$50,000 champagne binge with a red-haired torch singer after helping in the \$100,000 stickup of the Quonset Point, R. I. naval air station.

Howard Hildebrandt, 25, a former private detective and father of two children, said he spent most of his half-share profits of the March 7 robbery in riotous living with Gloria Dale, 30, a curvaceous New York night club singer. Hildebrandt was held in \$25,000 bail after waiving extradition to Rhode Island at his arraignment before U.S. commissioner Edward W. McDonald. Miss Dale, who apparently didn't meet her free-spend boy friend until after the robbery, was released on her own recognizance as a material witness.

FBI agents arrested the couple yesterday at a Times Square restaurant. The G-men said money found on Hildebrandt was identified as part of the loot.

His alleged accomplice in the bold daylight holdup in front of the station's credit union, Robert La Plante, 27, was picked up almost simultaneously by other agents at West Warwick, R. I.

Both men had been civilian employees at the naval base. Assistant U.S. attorney Martin Klein told McDonald that Hildebrandt had made a "complete" oral statement to FBI agents about his part in the robbery.

Hildebrandt, a medium-size pleasant appearing young man wearing rimless spectacles, apparently had been spending his loot on a good time in the big city at a \$200-\$300 a day clip. He began tossing out \$25 a bottle for champagne in Tony Pastor's Greenwich Village night club in mid-April, it was reported. The voluptuous and red-haired Miss Dale shortly became his "steady." Federal agents said Hildebrandt spent most of his time with her or in the club during her working hours for the last five or six weeks.

Hildebrandt and La Plante are charged with robbery on a government reservation. Federal funds were not involved.

Velde (R-Ill.) charged that he is and has been for years. Velde told O'Connor he is "extremely dangerous to our country." O'Connor said he is not a Communist now and was not a party member as far back as 10 years ago. But he refused to say whether he was a party member in the late 1930s.
