

Rates Are Reduced On Auto Insurance

Hoosier Car Owners Benefit By Slashes

INDIANAPOLIS (INS) — Hoosier car owners will benefit to the tune of three million dollars through a cut in automotive insurance premiums, effective today.

State insurance commissioner Harry E. Wells said the new rate schedules cover collision and comprehensive, and bodily injury and property damage.

The cuts, effective only on new policies and renewals, cover some 300 insurance companies affiliated with the National Automobile Underwriters association, and the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters.

Collision premiums are to be reduced, with the state average reduction 9.5 percent.

The reductions for bodily injury and property damage rates apply to only 12 vicinities.

For Indianapolis and Marion county and Terre Haute and Vigo county, the reduction on this category will range from \$4 to \$6 per policy.

For Anderson, Elkhart, Kokomo, Lafayette, West Lafayette, Logansport, Marion, LaPorte, Michigan City, Muncie and Richmond, and their respective vicinities, the reductions will range from \$1 to \$2.

Shipping Orders For Polio Vaccine

Pitman-Moore Will Supply Three States

INDIANAPOLIS (INS) — Pitman-Moore company, of Indianapolis, announced today it has received shipping orders to supply three

states with the balance needed to complete their first and second grade polio immunization programs.

Hibbard O. Ball, executive vice president of the Indianapolis pharmaceutical firm, said today's orders from the program with March of Dimes funds, are:

Oregon, 18,000 cubic centimeters; Michigan, 115,083 ccs., and Montana 5,001.

These Salk vaccine supplies, totaling 138,084 shots, will be shipped no later than Thursday, Ball said.

Today's three states brings to 236,275 ccs., the amount which has been shipped out of the new Pitman-Moore clearance of 440,000 ccs.

Indiana's other manufacturer of Salk polio vaccine, Eli Lilly and Company, already has shipped all supplies cleared by the national institutes of health and is awaiting further clearances.

Congressmen See Hope In Big Four Talk

George Convinced Russians Willing For Readjustment

WASHINGTON (INS) — Senate foreign relations chairman Walter F. George said today that opening developments at the Geneva conference have convinced him the Russians are "willing to make some readjustments."

The veteran Democrat from Georgia was less guarded in his optimism than were most other legislators who saw some hope in the progress of the Big Four talks. Two events prompted the optimistic reaction in Washington: Russia's agreement to discuss German unification first at Geneva and Soviet premier Nikolai Bulganin's acceptance of President Eisenhower's pledge that the U. S. will never wage aggressive war.

Sen. Charles E. Potter (D Mich.), legless combat veteran of World War II, said of the Soviet attitude: "Certainly their new face of harmony prevails. We hope it does in the last stage of the conference."

George said he does not believe Russia will "insist upon abandonment of NATO" as a concession for German unification.

Congress was impressed by Mr. Eisenhower's dramatic personal appeal to his wartime comrade in arms, Soviet defense minister Georgi Zhukov, to accept his word that America will never wage aggressive war.

Rep. Marguerite S. Church (R Ill.), said: "There seems to be every indication that the President is showing his sincere passion for peace but also his natural determination to be on guard."

Sen. Leverett Saltonstall, Mass., top Republican on the senate armed services committee, commented: "President Eisenhower's words express the feeling of the American people. I hope his recommendations lead to concrete results."

Rep. Leo O'Brien (D N.Y.), said of Russia's reaction to U. S. moves: "I think the words are wonderful but they're only the appetizer. If we get the deeds as the main course it will be one of the great events of our century."

"I think the President's hand has been strengthened by Senator George's proposal for a Big Four conference and by the number of Democrats who have stood up to say there will be no cry of appeasement from them over conference agreements."

Max Spencer Named Production Engineer

The new Chattanooga plant production engineer for Central Soya company is Max Spencer, according to a recent announcement by R. W. Fay, plant manager.

Spencer is a graduate of Purdue University with a degree in chemical engineering. He has been with Central Soya since 1947, spending most of that time in the company's technical division, and has been involved in the construction and operation of three soybean processing plants. His new duties will include planning, fabrication and installation of plant equipment from a production and engineering standpoint. Spencer is a member of the American oil chemists society and the American institute of chemical engineers.

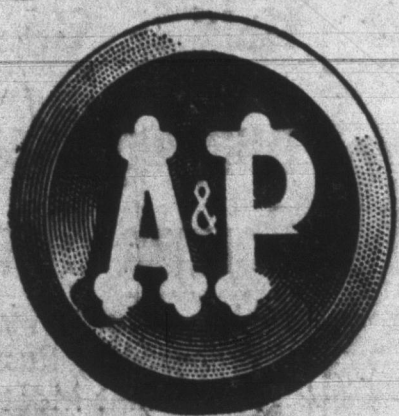

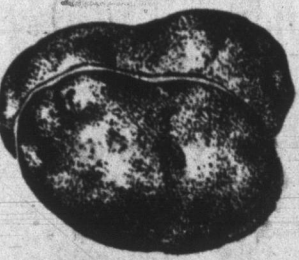

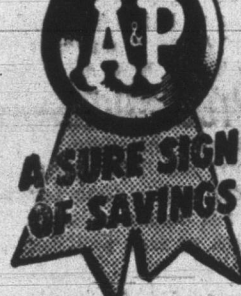
