Governor Expanding Political Activity

Stumps Washington, Oregon Next Year

INDIANAPOLIS (INS) Gov. George N. Craig expanded his program of outstate activity today. Craig, who has spent this week at the governors' conference in Chicago, will appear on a television program with Tennessee Democratic Governor Frank Clement at 8:45 o'clock tonight. Craig will discuss the record of President Eisenhower.

Then Craig will be a week end visitor at the Illinois gubernatorial mansion in Springfield. He is expected to talk tall politics with Illinois Republican Governor William G. Stratton.

Governor Craig Friday announced he would stump Oregon and Washington next year to help two Republican governors defeat two Democratic senators.

Republican Governor Paul L. Patterson is expected to challenge Democratic Senator Wythe L. Morse in Oregon and Republican Governor Arthur B. Langlie probably will run against Democratic Senator Warren G. Magnuson in Washington.

Governor Craig said:

"I am confident Langlie and Patterson can be elected and I shall do everything possible to assist them. It would vastly improve the statesmanship of the United States senate."

"So far as I can learn, Magnuson has contributed nothing whatever to the public welfare, while Morse has been actually detrimental."

Red Cross shelters Thursday night and early today.

The largest number to seek a haven from the storm were at Myrtle Beach, S. C., which was hard hit by hurricane Hazel last year. The Red Cross had 17 shelters open in the Myrtle Beach resort area.

Winds of 100 miles an hour lashed the Wilmington, N. C., area. Reports say flying glass and broken windows caused at least two minor injuries.

The weather bureau reported winds to 100 mph in squalls within 50 miles of the storm center and winds reaching hurricane force as far as 120 miles ahead of the storm and 60 miles to the south.
