Morse Challenges Secretary McKay

Grant To Private Utility Protested

WASHINGTON (INS) — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) challenged Interior Secretary Douglas McKay today to protest the federal power commission decision granting a private utility the right to develop Hells Canyon.

Morse called his fellow Oregon- ian "the secretary of private util- ities," who "walked out on the people's interest in this case."

On May 5, 1953, the interior de- partment withdrew its interven- tion in the Hells Canyon case be- cause it said there was a critical shortage of power in the Pacific Northwest and fast action was needed.

In a statement issued by his office at Washington, the senator said the Idaho Power Co. would not be required by the FPC order to build its three dams any quick- er than the one big dam which was proposed by public power ad- vocates.

Compared with five to eight years for the high dam, Morse continued, all three of the small- er units would not be in service for nine years and the last one might never be constructed.

Red Coalition Keeps Control Of San Marino

Wins Election In World's Smallest Republic Sunday

SAN MARINO (INS) — Com- munist and their Socialist allies have retained control of the world's smallest republic for four more years.

The left wing election victory in pocket - sized, mountaintop San-Marino Sunday was a painful blow to some 70 U.S. residents who had flown back to their native land to help oust the Reds.

Final results gave the Commu- nists 1,661 and the Nenni Social- ists 1,339 for a 3,000 total.

The Christian Democrats were credited with 2,102 and the Social Democrats with 256. This gave the anti-Red coalition 2,358.

The Communist Socialist major- ity of 642 compared with a scant 130 vote margin in the elections four years ago.

On the basis of the returns, show- ing the largest vote in the 1,600 year history of the state, the Com- munist and Socialists are expect- ed to have 33 seats in the San Marino grand council (parliament) against 27 for their opponents.

The red victory came in a day of Alice in Wonderland confusion in Western Europe's only Com- munist state which lies in the Ap- penines mountains 140 miles north of Rome.

Ten thousand curious tourists mingled with over a thousand San Marinese who had hurried home from the U.S., Belgium, France and Italy to help the 15,000 inhab- itants elect a government.

When the results became clear, a triumphal parade was organized by jubilant left wing demon- strators who circled the capital bang- ing garbage can lids and drums. They marched past the homes of the wealthiest anti-red citizens, cheering and shouting their party slogans.

One of the Americans who had flown in expressed the group's dis- appointment by saying:

"We just weren't numerous enough and didn't have time enough."
