Soybean Convention Slated Aug. 30-31 J. Ward Calland On Program At Cincy

HUDSON, Iowa — The interdependence of soybean producers, processors and other segments of the soybean industry will be given special emphasis on the program of the American soybean association convention at Cincinnati, Ohio, Aug. 30-31, says Geo. M. Strayer, executive vice president.

Not only are the American soybean association and the national soybean processors association holding joint meetings for the second time, but the session Wednesday morning, Aug. 31, will be devoted to the mutual interests and problems of the industry, says Strayer.

With record production and possible surpluses of soybeans ahead, there are problems of marketing and utilization that can only be solved by the united efforts of the whole industry, Strayer stresses.

Dwayne Andreas, president, Honeywell Products Co., Mankato, Minn., will speak on "The interdependence of soybean processors and growers."

J. W. Calland, managing director of the national soybean crop improvement council, will discuss the work of the council.

The processor association will hold its annual meeting Aug. 29 and the American soybean association the following two days. Both groups will meet in the air-conditioned Netherland Plaza Hotel.

School Ties Will Be Worn By Girls

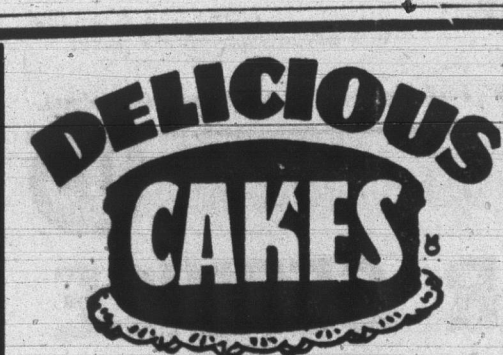
DALLAS, Tex. (INS) — Girls will be wearing ties this year as much — and probably more — than the boys.
