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Shortage Is Feared In Tomato Pickers

Migratory Workers May Avoid Indiana

INDIANAPOLIS (INS) — A possible shortage of tomato pickers may hit Indiana about the end of this month if migratory workers fail to shift to the state as they have in past years.

That outlook came from farm placement officials of the Indiana employment security division. They report a "noticeable decrease" in the number of Texas Mexicans shifting from northern cherry harvests to tomato areas, and add: "Some crews seem to be restless."

An IESD spokesman said the restlessness involved "shifting around a little more than usual, shopping for better housing and working conditions."

He said that the seasonal farm labor supply is sufficient at present but that if the migratory workers should leave when the heavy picking gets underway the state might have a shortage about the first of September.

Tomato canning plants have made trial run processing, with steady processing to get underway the last week of August, and move toward a mid September peak.

At Columbus, corn canning reached a peak and will continue about two more weeks. Corn processing began this week at Connersville. A few early lima beans were being canned in the Indianapolis area.

Port Wayne reported the pickle crop in that area had been hurt by heavy rains, but from Peru came a report that pickle prospects were improved.

Picking of melons was the only seasonal farm labor activity in the Vincennes area.

Hale Haven peaches were being picked this week at LaPorte after ripening was slowed by cooler weather and rains last week.

Cop Killer Is Taken Captive After Manhunt

Climaxes Manhunt Staged Following Detective Slaying

CHICAGO (INS) — One of the biggest manhunts in Chicago history ended Thursday night with the capture of accused police killer Richard Carpenter in a northwest side apartment.

The 26-year-old gunman surrendered to police with his hands in the air after they had poured machine gun and tear gas fire into the apartment.

Detectives reported Carpenter fell to his knees and begged the officers not to shoot him.

The dramatic capture climaxed a huge and relentless three day search launched after the slaying of detective William J. Murphy, 34, in the Roosevelt Rd. subway station Monday night by a gunman identified as Carpenter.

The young desperado had a bullet wound in his right leg which he apparently suffered when he seriously wounded patrolman Clarence Kerr, 26, in a gun battle at the Biltmore Theater Wednesday night.

As the dirty and disheveled Carpenter was hustled from the apartment building through a crowd of more than 5,000 persons who had converged on the scene, there were angry shouts of: "Kill him! Kill him!"

Carpenter was taken to the Bridewell hospital and then to the St. Mary's of Nazareth hospital where Kerr identified him.

Police then transported the gunman to central headquarters and questioned him throughout the night about the murder of Murphy.

Carpenter was seized after a desperate bid for freedom in which he held three members of a family captive in their apartment for 23 hours.

The outlaw forced his way at gunpoint into the apartment of Leonard Powell, 30, a truck driver, and his wife, Stella, the same age, following the theater shooting fray Wednesday night.

Powell told police Carpenter said: "You know who I am. I killed that police officer Monday night and I killed another one tonight. I'll kill anyone who tries to get me."

Your choice is simple. You do what I say or you'll die."

The gunman allowed Mrs. Powell and their children, Robert, 7, and Diane, to sleep in a rear bedroom, but forced Powell to sit up through the night while he watched television.

The next morning he let Powell go to work under threat of killing his family if the truck driver informed on him.

When Powell returned to the apartment and found Carpenter still there, he talked the outlaw into allowing him to go out to a drug store where he called police.

WABASH, Ind. (INS) — One plow match daily will be held during the four days of the state and national plowing contests near Wabash, Sept. 14-17. Prominent Hoosiers will be the starters.

Lieut. Gov. Harold W. Handley, as state commissioner of agriculture, will touch off the starting bomb for the first state match, Sept. 14.

George S. Diener, of Indianapolis, speaker of the Indiana house of representatives, will start the state level land contest, Sept. 15.

Claude R. Wickard, of Camden, former secretary of agriculture, will start the national contour match, Sept. 16.

And former Governor Henry F. Schricker, of Knox, will officiate at the national level land match, Sept. 17.

Dr. George W. Crane, prominent columnist, author and lecturer, will attend the plow match and afternoon of Sept. 14 and will speak at the Honeywell memorial building in Wabash that night on "positive thinking produces miracles" under auspices of the Wabash Tri Kappa sorority.

Also, the Indiana home economics chorus, directed by Al Stewart, of Purdue University, will sing the afternoon of Sept. 16. The group made a cross country tour to California last year and appeared in Europe two years ago.

Sheep dog trials, with entries from over the nation, will be held three days during the contest.

South Koreans Parade Before U. S. Embassy

Protest Delivered By South Korea On Shooting Civilians

SEOUL (INS) — South Korean demonstrators today paraded before the U.S. embassy, where the ROK foreign ministry lodged an official protest over the shooting of three civilians last week in Inchon harbor.

A foreign ministry source said the protest was delivered to the embassy Thursday but did not divulge contents of the note.

Both Thursday and today students in military formation marched silently past the embassy carrying posters demanding the ouster of neutral truce inspectors.

Their action was in defiance of a flat ban against such demonstrations by President Syngman Rhee.

Violence flared anew in four separate attempts to storm the neutral nations truce team compound at Kunsan today.

American guards dispersed a mob of about 100 students with high pressure fire hoses three times between midnight and 2:45 a.m.

Later in the morning South Korean police halted 50 demonstrators before they reached the U.S. manned barricade outside the compound.

Crew Of Freighter On Fire Rescued

LONDON (INS) — The crew of the 7,000 ton British freighter Argobeam which caught fire in the North Atlantic was transferred today to the Swedish ship Kungsholm which answered a distress call.

The British air ministry's meteorological office also reported that a weather ship, Weather Recorder, was standing by the stricken Argobeam which will be towed to port.

The Rev. Augustyn Kondziela, host pastor, will deliver the sermon. A large number of men from St. Mary's parish in Decatur are expected to attend the services.

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
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
