Another Good Night's Sleep For President

Eisenhower Enters On Final 48 Hours Of Crucial Period

DENVER (INS) — President Eisenhower spent another "good night" as he entered the final 48 hours in the crucial two-week period of his recuperation from a heart attack.

A 9 a.m. (EST) bulletin from Fitzsimons army hospital reported that the President's condition "continues to progress satisfactorily without complications"—the familiar phrase used to describe his steady progress toward recovery.

Mr. Eisenhower awoke "refreshed and relaxed" after a sound night's sleep of eight and one-half hours from 9:30 to 6 a.m.

Mr. Eisenhower gets a day off from official duties today after signing or initialing six more documents Wednesday, including commissions for four recess appointments.

There are no plans for the President to sign any more papers until his chief deputy, Sherman Adams, returns to Denver from Washington Saturday.

Adams flew back to the capital Wednesday to attend today's meeting of the national security council and the Friday cabinet meeting.

With Adams at his side to assure him that everything was in proper order, the President has signed or initialed 16 official papers and given oral approval to two other matters since last Friday. He also sent off a letter to Vice President Richard M. Nixon asking him to continue holding meetings of the cabinet and security council.

When Adams flies back to Denver Saturday he will bring Dr. Paul Dudley White, Boston heart specialist, along with him.

Dr. White, who has been overseeing the President's treatment by long-distance telephone, will make a personal check on the patient's progress during the critical two weeks since his heart attack Sept. 24.

Then he will decide in consultation with Mr. Eisenhower's other doctors whether the President can begin holding conferences with administration officials and otherwise taking a more active role in government.

Mr. Eisenhower received what was officially described as a "great kick" Wednesday out of the box of gifts from his three grandchildren.

David, 7, Barbara, 6, and three-year-old Susan Eisenhower each included several gift-wrapped pieces of bubble-gum for their grandfather. There were also crayon drawings from each of the youngsters, along with playing cards, stationery and get-well greetings.

David also sent his grandfather a 25-cent western thriller entitled "The MacKenzie Raid."

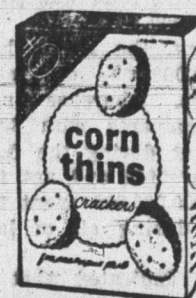
