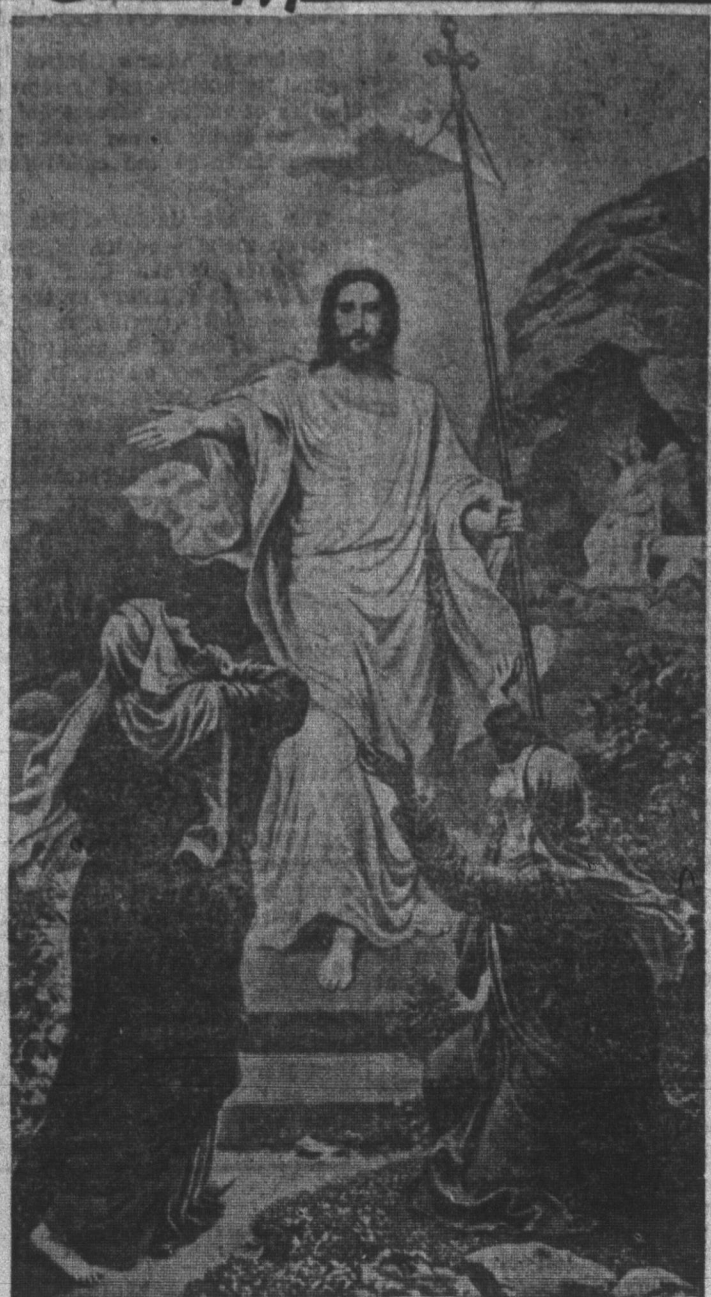

Large Barn, Contents Destroyed By Fire

Decatur firemen were summoned at 1 a. m. Thursday to the Harry Kershner farm, a mile north and a half-mile west of Coppess Corner. A large barn, and most of its contents were completely destroyed, and the fire loss is estimated at thousands of dollars.

Destroyed in the blaze were five cows, several hogs, a 1949 model automobile, a tractor and many other farm implements, and a sizable quantity of hay, straw, oats, and corn.

Origin of the fire is unknown. Firemen were able to save the house and a nearby garage, but a corn crib near the garage was also destroyed.

Festival Services Easter Sunday Morn

We invite you to worship with us if you have no other church home."

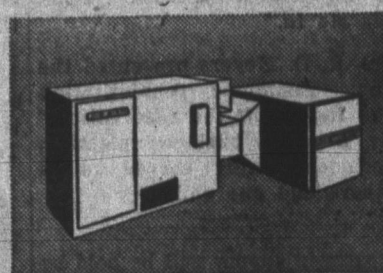

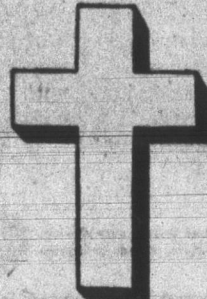
