## Fall Convention Of Christian Churches

### To Hold Convention In Decatur Sunday

The annual fall convention of the Christian churches of Adams, Wells, Huntington, Wabash, and Grant counties will be held at First Christian church of this city, Sunday afternoon and evening. The first session will begin at 2:30 p.m. with registration of the delegates, after which Larry Brandon, a member of the committee of 35, will present the report and recommendations of that committee. Brandon is a long time member of the Christian church. He was for several years an active member of one of Indiana's largest farm organizations, where his outstanding contributions to the agricultural circles of the state made him a friend and counselor to those interested in farming.

Following Brandon's message there will be a period of discussion, followed by a dinner at 5:30. Before the recess period, the Rev. W. Robert Lewis, director of church relations at the school of

religion, Butler University, will address the group on the subject "Training for the Ministry." Rev. Lewis has been with the school of religion since 1948. His record of church service includes four years as minister in a yoked-field at the Russellville and Waverland Christian church, Indianapolis, and seven years at Seventh Christian church of that city. Rev. Lewis has rendered a fine service in several branches of interdenominational work in which the Christian church is vitally interested.

At evening worship service, which will bring the convention to an end, will begin at 7:30. The Rev. J. Maurice Thompson, minister of the Central Christian church, Huntington, who is president of fifth district, will preside. Those participating in the service will be the Rev. Levon Fisher, minister of the First Christian church, Marion, the Rev. Traverse W. Chandler, host pastor, and Dr. Tayoz W. Nakari, professor of Semitic languages and literature, school of religion, Butler University, who will speak on the subject "An Adequate Ministry." Dr. Nakari received his A. B. degree at Kokugakuin University, Tokyo, in 1920; an A. B. degree at Butler University in 1924; an M. A. degree there in 1925; his Ph. D. degree at the University of Michigan in 1930. He has done post-doctorate studies at the universities of Michigan, Chicago, Union Theological Seminary, Hebrew Union College, and the linguistic institute of America, New York University. Dr. Nakari is an author of considerable note, having written several books on Japan, and his chosen field of Semitic languages and literature.

The public is invited to hear Dr. Nakari deliver his message on the ministry.
