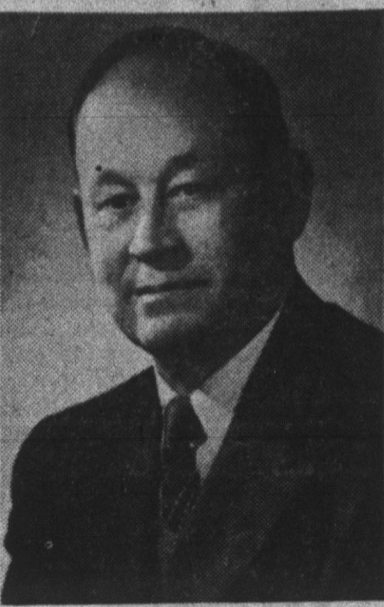

Clinton county coroner Charles Johnson ruled his death a suicide. He said Kleinsmith, widely known in Indiana Shrine circles, shot himself. He had been in failing health.

NEW REGIME

But the radio, although besieged for a time by the rebels, was solidly in government hands and it was telling the government side of the story.

A 2 p.m. (7 a.m. CST) surrender deadline was ignored by the rebels, and then was extended another four hours to 6 p.m.

At least one Soviet soldier was reported killed. But the number of civilian and military casualties was not known.

The ministry of the interior clamped a dusk-to-dawn curfew on Budapest, and an official announcement at 4:15 p.m. said that "some areas of the city, have not yet been cleared of counter-revolutionary groups." The announcement did not say in which parts of the city the fighting still raged.

Reports reaching the West said the Russians had completely surrounded Budapest and were using tanks, machine guns and heavy armored cars.

Radio Budapest said Nagy received a five-man delegation of counter-revolutionaries from one area who offered to surrender if they were not court-martialed. Use of the word "court-martial" indicated the delegation may have included members of the Hungarian armed forces. Nagy accepted their offer.

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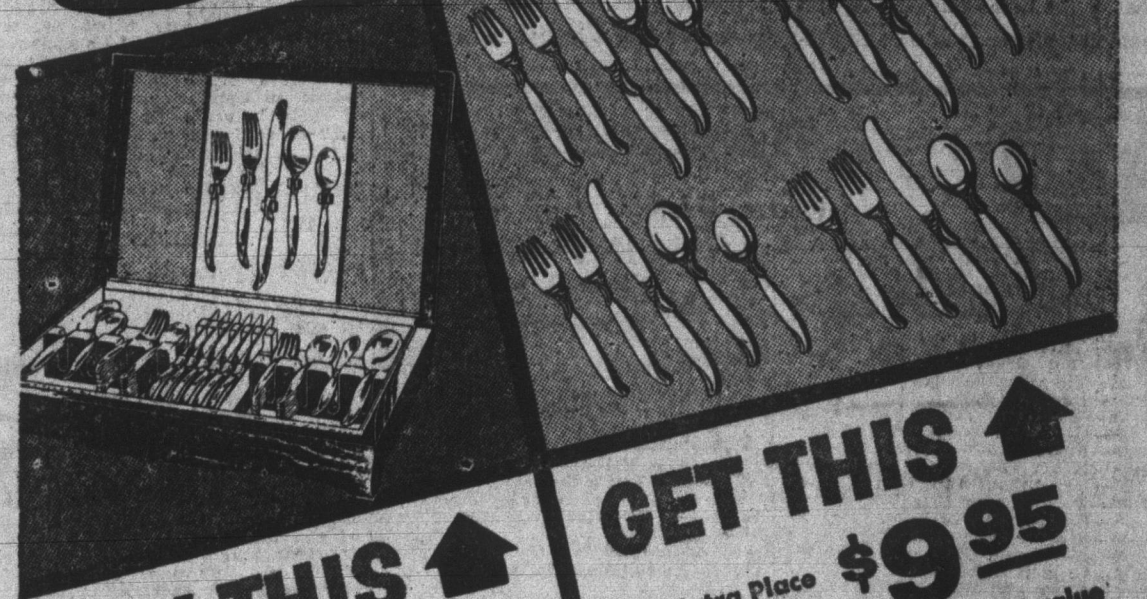
