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The institution of "Tuck or Treat" was put to good use when the young people of the Associated Churches of Decatur raised \$411.54 for the United Nations International children's emergency fund.

Awards to the 4-H club boys and girls will be made at a banquet November 13 sponsored by the retail division of the Decatur Chamber of Commerce. The certificates and pins to be given them will represent only a small part of the rewards of this program which produces our future agricultural leaders.

Voting poses problems to many, but a safe rule to follow is to endorse the party which you know has given good service. Our boys and girls of school age are increasing at a prodigious rate. It's been necessary for Wabash township to follow the lead of other communities in the county in planning a major expansion of its facilities at Geneva. It's also time to give consideration to Tucker's program of spreading the tax base by accepting federal aid for schools. As long as Indiana citizens pay federal taxes they should have their share of federal expenditures in the state. The policy of the present state administration in turning back federal aid to Indiana has proved costly and has helped none but the other states which kept the money Indiana refused.

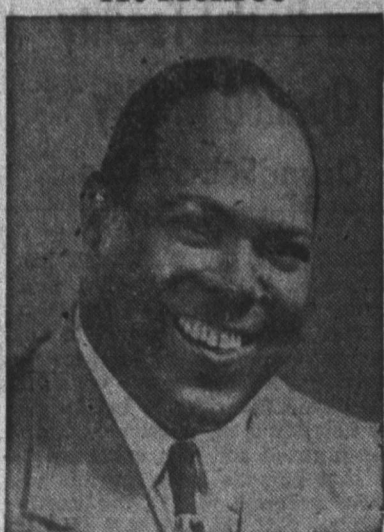
## Bus Trip

Pruth McFarlin, known as "America's greatest Negro tenor," will present a concert of favorite hymns and ballads, Negro spirituals and familiar operatic airs at the Monroe Methodist church Sunday evening at 7:30 o'clock. He will be accompanied by John Martin, pianist-composer. McFarlin was the victim of polio in 1918, but worked his way through Southern University, Baton Rouge, La., and won scholarships in voice at the Eastman school of music, Rochester, N. Y., and with the late Frank LaForge in New York, whose pupils included Marian Anderson, Richard Crooks, Lily Pons and Lawrence Tibbett. The public is invited to attend the concert.
