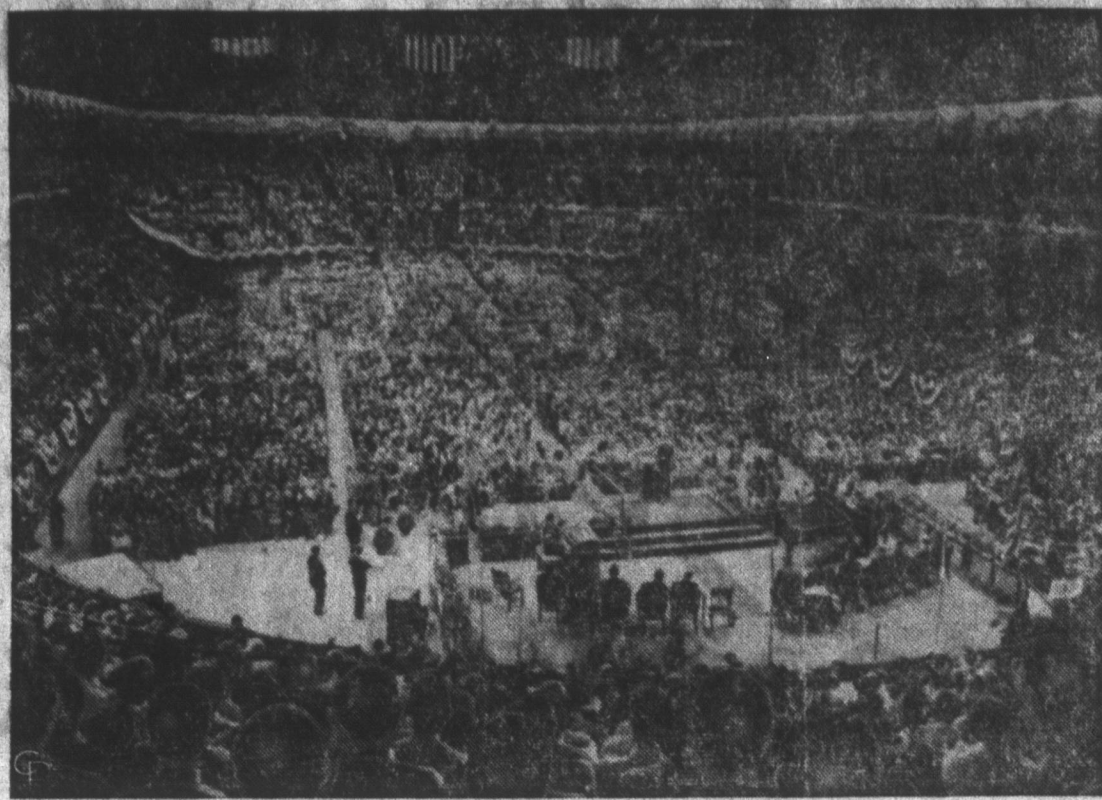

### Evangelist Graham Cheered By Crusade

May Extend Crusade Beyond Six Weeks

NEW YORK (UP)—Evangelist Billy Graham said Thursday night his crusade against New York's crime and sin already appears to be more successful than any campaign he has ever undertaken. He said the New York Crusade is backed by "probably the greatest concentration of prayer in the history of the Christian Church."

"People the world over are praying for the success of this crusade," he said. "This is the one everyone is interested in. I can feel their prayers."

Graham's second night audience at Madison Square Garden was logged by Garden officials at 13,000, a drop of 5,500 from the near capacity gathering at opening night. But Graham said he thought it was proportionately a record for a second night. "It always drops off the second night and then it gathers momentum," he said.

The energetic evangelist said he was so encouraged by the turnout for his war on sin that he expects to extend it well beyond the originally planned six weeks. He said he hoped to hold a giant outdoor meeting for 100,000 persons this fall in Yankee Stadium or the Polo Grounds.

Some 545 "inquirers" made "decisions for Christ" Thursday night after hearing Graham in a fiery indictment of "this morally sick world." The handsome, 38-year-old crusader dropped some of the restraint of his previous night's sermon, but the address still was somewhat short of the "hell fire and brimstone" of an old-fashioned revival meeting.

Earlier Thursday, Graham told a group of ministers that "God will hear the prayers of his people until the cleansing stream will flow like a river through this great metropolis."

He told the ministers his crusade was on the verge of scoring a "major breakthrough" in the battle to win the city's "unchurched" millions to Christ.

### Strict Code Formed For Grade Students

Catholic Schools In Peoria Form Code

PEORIA, Ill. (UP)—Some 6,000 Roman Catholic grade school students in the Peoria area will be prohibited from dating, dancing or attending unchaperoned mixed parties after the opening of classes next fall.

The strict code was published Thursday in the Peoria Register, official diocesan newspaper. The publication said the prohibitions were agreed upon at a meeting of priests and officials of the 15 Peoria area Roman Catholic schools.

The purpose of the code is to "retain for grade school boys and girls their proper treasure of childhood and to retard premature acceleration into social ventures," the Peoria Register said.

The announcement said lipstick and other makeup will be banned for girls in the parochial schools. Parents also were urged to enforce a nightly curfew for their children and keep a close check on the books they read, the television shows and movies they watch and the radio and phonograph records they listen to.

The priests said they hoped the code would spread to other sections of the diocese.

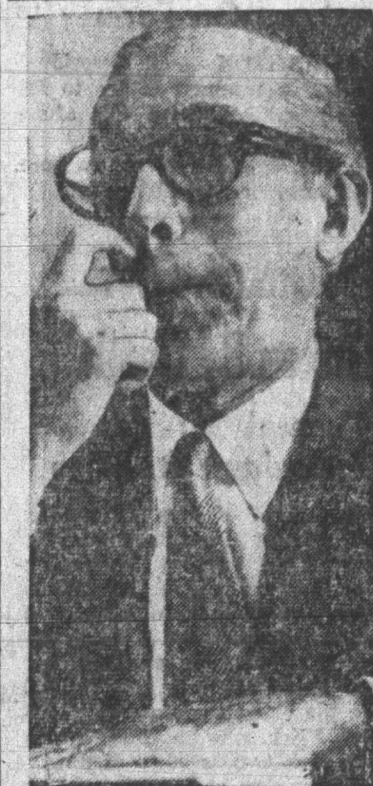
They said the rules were drawn up because "many parents are anxiously seeking a common code of legislation" for their children.

The code permits mixed parties if they are sponsored by the schools, and allow children to attend other mixed social activities only if they are closely chaperoned.

### Egypt Bound To Run Canal On Own Terms

Egypt Newspapers Assail Eisenhower For Backing Israel

Egypt stiffened its determination today to run the Suez Canal on its own terms and informed sources in Cairo said Anglo-French pressure in the forthcoming U.N. Security Council debate would not change its stand.

The Egyptian sources said the country was optimistic that outcome of the debate would not weaken Egypt's authority over the canal. They said shipping companies using the canal have made no complaint.

Egyptian newspapers attacked President Eisenhower for the second day for saying Israel has a right to send a test ship through the canal.

The government newspaper Al Goumhouria said "any person endowed with common sense will realize that the words 'rights, security and justice' by Eisenhower constitute a screen vainly designed to conceal American policy aimed at sowing the seeds of unrest among the Arabs for the sake of both imperialism and Zionism."

An Israeli government spokesman said in Jerusalem that Israel would wait until after the U.N. debate before deciding whether to send a ship through the canal to test the Egyptian boycott of Israeli shipping.

The Norwegian freighter Mars waited at Haifa, loaded with 4,500 tons of potash and industrial goods for Japan, but Israel officials said this would not constitute a true test since the ship is owned by a Norwegian firm and is under charter to an American firm.

At the same time Israeli government circles expressed disappointment in President Eisenhower's Wednesday statement that Egyptian interference with Israeli shipping would give Israel a case for the International Court.

They said this would cause delay and would be just what Egypt wants and might conceal the fact that the Security Council already has ruled that Israel has the same right as other nations to use the canal.

Egypt meanwhile received new backing from Syria and Lebanon in its stand against Israeli shipping. Syrian authorities said passage of any Israeli vessel "by force" would lead to war.

A Tel Aviv dispatch quoting French sources said the Syrian general staff fears Israeli forces could reach Damascus within six days if war broke out.

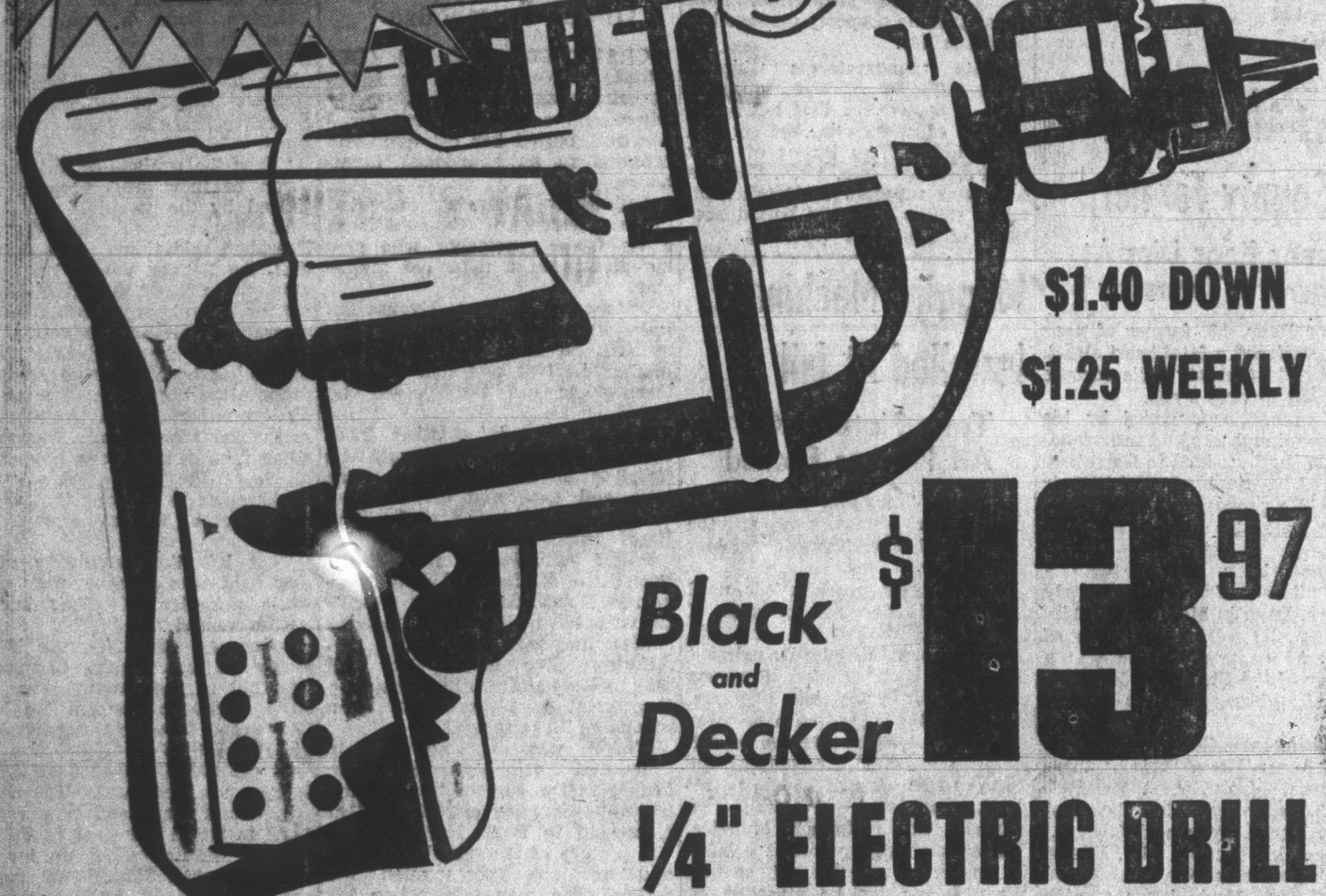

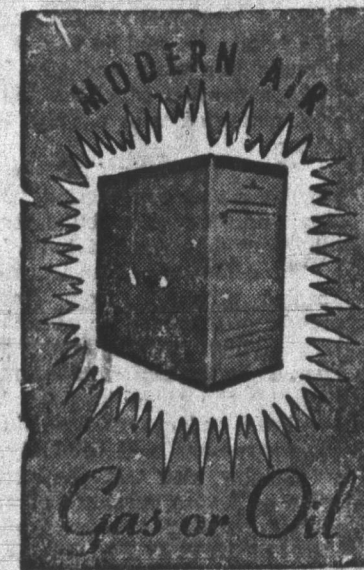
