

## Communist China Shakes Up Military

TOKYO (UPI) — Radio Peiping announced today the firing of Communist Chinese Defense Minister Marshal Peng Teh-huai, the man who led the Red Chinese "volunteers" across the Yalu River into Korea against Gen. Douglas MacArthur nine years ago.

In a wide-ranging shakeup of the Communist Chinese military forces, changes in the jobs of chief of the general staff of the people's liberation army and the minister of public security also were announced.

The reshuffle in the top military posts suggested the possibility that a new military adventure may be in the offing.

The changes were announced without comment at the end of a lengthy report on pardons "for a

number of war criminals, counterrevolutionary criminals and common criminals who have really changed their ways and behaved well."

The amnesty was declared in observance of the 10th anniversary of the founding of Communist China on Oct. 1. There was no mention of American or other foreigners jailed by the Reds, but it was thought possible they would be covered by the pardon extended to "counter-revolutionaries."

The broadcast said Peng had been "relieved" of his post as defense minister and replaced by Marshal Lin Piao, whose troops were the first to cross the Yalu in 1950 against American-led United Nations forces in the Korean War. Lin is considered Red

China's top military strategist. Lo Jui-ching, long the hatchet man of the Communist regime, was relieved as minister of public security and named chief of the general staff.

He replaced Huang Ke-cheng, who became chief of the general staff only last October during the height of the crisis over the offshore islands of Matsu and Quemoy in the Formosa Strait.

HIGHLAND, Ind. (UPI) — Two trucks crashed head-on in U. S. 41 in Highland early today, killing one driver and injuring the other critically.

Henry Goaler, 49, Chicago, was killed, and Cleo Fisher, Jasper, Ind., was hurt badly and taken to St. Margaret's Hospital in Hammond.

Goaler was headed north and Fisher south when the vehicles smashed together at the intersection of the highway and 45th Ave.

## Italian Death Toll Grows As Rubble Removed

BARLETTA, Italy (UPI) — Rescue workers dug feverishly through the rubble of a five-story apartment building today, fearful they would find the bodies of many more residents of the new building which collapsed Wednesday at dawn.

The bodies of 40 men, women and children, some of them crushed beyond recognition, had already been found. Thirteen persons, all severely injured, were pulled out of the wreckage but it was feared the final death toll might be anywhere from 60 to 100.

The job of digging through the huge mass of concrete, rock and

twisted metal went on through the night under powerful spotlights. But it was an almost hopelessly frustrating task.

"The only one who can possibly survive this tragedy are the 13 injured who are now in the hospital," a police official said.

About 600 soldiers, firemen, policemen and monks worked around the clock clearing away layer after layer of rubble.

How many more bodies may be under the rubble was not known, for these were many more families living in the new building than the 24 registered with city offices.

E. Dambrosio, commander of the Barlett fire brigade, said every brick and stone in the 30-foot high mass of rubble would have to be removed to uncover all the victims. He estimated there may be another 30 to 60 bodies in the rubble.
