College Cheating Cited By Ellison

Jerome Ellison, the Indiana University Journalism professor who was recently dropped from the faculty, comes up with another controversial Saturday Evening Post article Jan. 9 with "American Disgrace: College Cheating."

In was another article on colleges, "Are We Turning Our Colleges Into Playgrounds," that got the outspoken Ellison into hot water with university officials. While I. U. department of journalism officials claim that Ellison was dropped because of incompetence in several vital areas of teaching, the general consensus is that he was dropped because of the stringent article, especially the parts about I. U.

In his latest effort, Ellison, a veteran Post contributor, calls "cheating" a force which could produce self-destruction and put the nation in a spiral, spinning toward national suicide.

As he says, "The chinks in the moral armor of American students are most obvious in regard to cheating. . . . The practice is so widespread as to challenge the well-nigh universal claim that they value honesty as a moral virtue."

With a backlog of a year's work of personal interviews, questionnaires, correspondence and other surveys, Ellison shows that cheating prevails at the individual level and on an organized basis.

Mitchell said that he and Nixon made a settlement recommendation in economic terms to both parties. Jet Airlines Break Four Speed Records

By United Press International Jet airlines, helped along by tail winds of up to 120 miles per hour set four east-bound transcontinental speed records Sunday. Vice President Richard M. Nixon was aboard an American Airlines Boeing 707 Sunday that raced 2,399 miles from Los Angeles to Washington-Baltimore Friendship Airport in three hours 30 minutes.

Nixon's flight with a capacity load of 112 passengers broke a record of 112 passengers, a mark of four hours flat for the run. Another American 707 jet set a Los Angeles-Boston record of four hours, 24 minutes, carrying 114 passengers and a crew of eight. The plane made the 2,790-mile flight at an average speed of 635 miles per hour, eclipsing a one-day-old record of four hours, 39 minutes also held by American. A Trans World Airlines 707 carrying 114 passengers averaged 600 miles an hour for a 2,451-mile Los Angeles-New York run. The three hours, 57 minutes flight trimmed six minutes from a mark that TWA set Saturday.

An Eastern Airlines Douglas DC8B flew 2,339 miles from Long Beach, Calif. to Miami in three hours, 38 minutes and 55 seconds, an average speed of 584 miles an hour, which Eastern said was a record for the southern transcontinental route.

INDIANAPOLIS (UPD)—Governor Handley today announced the appointment of Robert E. Hughes, 22, Greenwood attorney, as his executive secretary at \$11,000 a year. Hughes succeeds Robert J. Fink, Shelbyville, who recently was appointed Handley's administrative assistant. Fink changed jobs when Edwin W. Beaman became GOP state chairman and left the Handley staff.
