Income Tax Cheats Costly To Treasury

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Justice Department plans to get together with income tax evaders and others who try to chisel the federal government. Asst. Atty. Gen. Charles K. Rice, chief of the department's tax division, said Sunday night in a year-end report to Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers that income tax cheats are costing the treasury large amounts in revenue. Rice said his division was setting up a program for cracking down on persons who claim false dependency exemptions and in a "substantial number" of cases involving "wilful omission" of dividend and interest income from tax returns. In another year-end report, acting Asst. Atty. Gen. Robert A. Bicks said 63 anti-merger cases were filed last year, more than in any year since 1943. Bicks said Justice Department attorneys were concentrating on "vigorous enforcement" of the Clayton Act's anti-merger provisions to help growing new industries survive in competition with giant corporations.

Seek Death Penalty For Finch, Tregoff

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The state today was expected to ask the death penalty for Dr. R. Bernard Finch and his paramour, Carol Tregoff, accused of killing the physician's estranged wife to get her share of the family fortune. The prosecution, which will lead off with opening arguments, contends the motive for the fatal shooting was a desire by Finch, 42, to wed his 23-year-old former receptionist without having to split an estimated \$750,000 in community property with his 33-year-old wife, Barbara. The prosecution further contends that Finch and Miss Tregoff carried a "murder kit" July 18 to do away with Mrs. Finch by medical means, but shot her instead when a Swedish exchange student interrupted their plans. Mrs. Finch instituted a divorce action against her handsome, tennis-player husband May 20, less than two months before her body was found shot through the back on the lawn of the \$65,000 Finch home in nearby West Covina. Under California law, community property is shared equally by a divorced couple. Both Finch and Miss Tregoff are charged with first degree murder and conspiracy to commit murder. Conviction of first degree murder here carries a possible death sentence.

Ralph Palmer Dies After Heart Attack

Ralph E. Palmer, 61, of Monroeville, died at 6:30 p. m. Saturday at Parkview memorial hospital following a heart attack. He operated a battery repair shop at Monroeville until 1942, when he joined the Allen county highway department as a supervisor. Surviving are his wife, Marie; a daughter, Mrs. Joan Gronau of Monroeville, route 1; two sisters, Mrs. Iva Miller of Craigville, and Miss Ethel Palmer of Auburn, and one granddaughter. Services will be held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at the Marquart funeral home in Monroeville, with burial in the Monroeville IOOF cemetery.

West's All-Stars Win Shrine Thriller

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Southern Methodist's Don Meredith, Indiana's Ted Aureman and Oregon's John Wilcox, Notre Dame's George Izo, Stanford's Chris Burford, Clemson's Lou Cordleone. Arkansas Wins In Gator Bowl, 14-7

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (UPI) — Both coaches agreed that Arkansas' backfield speed was the difference in the Razorbacks' 14-7 win over Georgia Tech in the Gator Bowl Saturday.

But the real heroes in the Razorback victory probably were Frank Broyles' outweighed linemen who held Tech scoreless for the last three quarters. Tech Coach Bobby Dodd said it would take three touchdowns to win and he was right. Broyles hadn't counted on more than two touchdowns and that was all he needed. His light but rugged line, with a weight disadvantage of some 20 pounds per man, bottled up the Yellowjackets after trailing 7-0 in the first period, and Jim Moody and company took care of the scoring department with touchdowns in the second and third periods.

Tech was by far the superior team in the opening quarter, controlling play for all but about two minutes, chiefly on ground plays up the middle. It looked like the biggest bowl game mismatch of the week end, with Arkansas gaining only three yards. Quarterback Marvin Tibbets set sail on a 51-yard scoring run in the closing seconds of the period and Tech was off to an early 7-0 lead. "We were just scared," Broyles said after the game. "Bobby's boys were ready and it took us a while to get started."
