Muncie Central Is Unanimous Pick For Top

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — Muncie Central ruled the roost today in Indiana high school basketball with the second straight perfect score from the United Press International coaches' board.

The championship game will be played at 8:15 p.m. Saturday.

Tickets On Sale

Season tickets, priced at \$2 for the four-session tourney, are on sale at all seven competing schools. Single session tickets, priced at 75 cents, will be on sale only at the Adams Central gym box office, immediately prior to each session.

Kenneth Van Emon, principal of the Hartford Center high school, is manager of the 1960 tourney, and Adams Central will have charge of the concessions this year.

Tourney officials will be Baldwin and Yohe, both of Muncie.

Trophies for the champions of both first team and second team tourneys are awarded annually by the Decatur Daily Democrat, and will be presented by Gail Grubbs, county school superintendent, immediately following the final game Saturday night. Grubbs will also present the Everett Rice sportsmanship trophy, donated by Robert Monnier, after the final game. The Limberlost bell, traveling trophy of the Adams county schools, and now held by Adams Central, will also go to the county champion for possession until defeated by another county team, with the exception of sectional tourney play, when no trophies may be awarded, under rules of the IHSAA.

Berne, Geneva In Second Team Tourney Finals

Berne and Geneva reserves teams will battle Friday night for the Adams county second team championship as the result of victories scored Tuesday night in tourney semi-finals played at the Berne gym.

The championship game will be played at 7 o'clock Friday evening at the Adams Central gym as a preliminary to the Geneva-Adams Central first team tourney tilt.

Berne will be defending its county title, won last year.

Both teams won with little difficulty last night.

Berne led all the way in the opener to eliminate Adams Central. Berne was in front at all periods, 15-4, 24-12, and 40-30. Habegger was the winners with 15 points and E. Inniger added 11. No Adams Central player reached double figures. Heyerly leading with the title last June.

Geneva was in the lead at all periods, 14-8, 19-12, and 27-18, to defeat Monmouth in the nightcap, 38-25. Norr topped the defending champions with 17 points, while Brown and Kolter each tallied seven for the Eaglets.

These teams met last month at Berne, with Geneva winning by a 42-30 score.

Annual Mies Classic Will Open Saturday

Unitas Named As Outstanding Pro Gridster

NEW YORK (UPI) — John Unitas, 26-year-old quarterback for the champion Baltimore Colts, today was named the outstanding National Football League player of 1959 in the annual United Press International poll.

Unitas won easily. He received 20 of the 31 votes cast by sports writers who covered the 1959 games in the 11 NFL cities.

Jim Brown, Cleveland Brown fullback who led the 1958 voting, was a distant second with three votes after leading the league in rushing for the third straight season since entering the professional game.

Two "old pro" quarterbacks, Charley Conerly of the New York Giants and Bobby Layne of the Pittsburgh Steelers, and Raymond Berry, Baltimore offensive end, tied for third with two votes each. J. D. Smith, offensive halfback for the San Francisco Forty-Niners, and Pat Summerall, New York's place-kicker, split the remaining two votes.

Unitas, whose passing ability makes the Western Division All-Stars favorites over the East for Sunday's annual Pro Bowl game at Los Angeles, showed the marvelous consistency in 1959 that has marked his play since he joined the Colts in 1956.

Working behind Jim Parker, Art Spinney, Buzz Nutter and other huskies who provide what Coach Jim Lee Howell of the Giants calls "the league's best blocking for a passer," Unitas led the Colts to their second straight Western Division title.

He completed an all-time season high of 32 touchdown passes during the regular 1959 campaign while leading the league in completions (193) and passing yardage (2,899). He also led in attempts with 367 throws.

Unitas, signed by the Colts as a free agent for the cost of an 80-cent telephone call to Pittsburgh in 1956, is the most consistent passer to grace the NFL since Otto Graham guided the Browns to six division titles in as many tries in 1950-55. Unitas has thrown at least one touchdown pass in his last 37 regular season games, an NFL record.
