Engine Number To Be
Important In 1962

Walter Koos, Adams county assessor, said today that the engine number of a licensed vehicle will be highly important when securing Indiana motor vehicle license plates in 1962.

Under provisions of a new state tax law, all applicants will be required to provide the license branch office with an identification slip bearing the engine number, and, on the back, a clearance by the county treasurer for each vehicle.

If a family has one car, one such identification slip will be provided. If two cars are owned, two slips will have to be presented. If a truck fleet owner has 100 trucks, he will have a clearance slip for each of the 100 vehicles, each bearing its own engine number, with notification on the back from the county treasurer's office that taxes have been paid on that particular vehicle.

Although workings of the new law will not touch the general public directly until application is made for 1962 license plates, first phases of the different approach will be started as assessors make the rounds this year, inasmuch as 1960 taxes will be paid in 1961, and the 1961 computations will be used to obtain 1962 license plates.

This year the assessor will ask a new question. It will be, "What is the engine number of your auto or truck?" If the citizen is not able to answer this question, the assessor is required by law to get this information. The assessor, in turn, enters the number in a new space provided on the 1960 schedule of property on which each person will be taxed.

Meanwhile, as each vehicle owner procures 1960 and 1961 license plates, the fourth copy of each such application is forwarded from the license branch to the proper township assessor's office.

In the assessor's office, each application copy, complete with engine number, will be compared to the assessor's schedule of property and the engine number given to the assessor by owners. They must coincide. The township assessor's office will then arrange these slips in alphabetical order and present them to the county treasurer.

When the taxpayers pays the fall tax installment, the county treasurer will give the customary tax receipt, and, in addition, refer to the identification slips provided by the township assessor.

The county treasurer will certify on the back of this identification slip that the car owner has paid taxes and is eligible for a license tag for the given vehicle. The tax receipt now required will not be used.

Judge Rules Medics
Right To Save Baby

DANVILLE, Ind. (UPI) — A judge ruled late Wednesday that doctors have a legal right to save the life of a newborn baby with blood transfusions despite the objections of the parents on religious grounds.

Judge Richard Groover of Hendricks Circuit Court issued a restraining order which bars Mr. and Mrs. Richard Smock, Claytown, from interfering with medical care for the child, expected in about four weeks.

Dr. David B. Haggard, Plainfield, the family's physician and surgeon, and Dr. Herbert F. Call, Indianapolis, asked for the court order. They said blood transfusions may be necessary because the parents have conflicting blood types.

The Smocks, who are members of the Jehovah's Witnesses religious sect, object to blood transfusions because they believe the Bible warns against partaking of any blood.

"I love my unborn child," Mrs. Delores Smock, 28, told the court during a two-hour hearing. "But the doctors cannot assure its life. The eternal life of this child is far more important to me than my life or its life here on earth," she said.

Smock, 28, an insurance agent, and his wife presented their own case. Each held a Bible while testifying.

Haggard, who had termed the Smocks "very fine people" told the judge he was "reasonably sure" the child, expected about the middle of February, would need blood transfusions to live. Smock has RH positive blood and his wife, RH negative.

The couple lost one child about nine years ago. They have two healthy children, 4 and 6.

Attorney James Raber, Danville, presented the doctors' case. "These people want the court to break the law of the land for their religious beliefs but they also want the protection of the court," Raber charged. "They want our country protected but they won't help fight for it."

God Will Judge
The Rev. John Hathaway, presiding minister of the Smocks' church, also testified. He warned the judge that if he ruled in favor of the doctors, "God will judge you, the witnesses and the attorneys."

Smock indicated that he would accept the court order as deciding the issue.

"We've done all we can," he said after the hearing.

But two unidentified women friends of the Smocks were less charitable. "What about the hereafter?" one asked as they left the courtroom. "They don't care about that," the other responded, presumably referring either to the court or the doctors. "They just want to be big shots on this little earth."

Government Of
De Gaulle Faces
Severe Crisis

PARIS (UPI) — The government of President Charles de Gaulle was faced today with its worst political crisis over the firing of Finance Minister Antoine Pinay.

The ostensibly "friendly" parting Wednesday of De Gaulle and the minister who worked with him for 19 months to guide France back to economic stability threatened to unleash powerful political forces that could tear the De Gaulle cabinet asunder.

Pinay publicly disavowed any intention to lead a conservative revolt against the policies of De Gaulle but political observers believed he would eventually find himself, perhaps unwillingly, at the head of the growing offense against De Gaulle launched by rightwingers.

Such opposition could lead to a disastrous split in the parliamentary majority needed by Premier Michel Debre, whose clashes with Pinay led to the finance minister's decision Wednesday to step down rather than accept another cabinet post offered him by De Gaulle.

Political leaders such as Felix Gaillard of the middle-road radical party predicted that when Parliament reconvenes in April Debre will be voted out and Parliament dissolved.

"Then we'll see," Gaillard said. What France could "see" was a much more authoritarian regime, with De Gaulle, using the De Gaulle - failed constitution of the Fifth Republic, bypassing Parliament and ruling by presidential decree.

Since Parliament was not slated to meet again until April, the De Gaulle government had time to mend its political fences. But a "crisis" atmosphere persisted in the French capital.

Locally Heavy Rain
Forecast In State

Locally heavy rain and rising temperatures lay just ahead on the Indiana weather horizon today.
