## Farmers Union Asks For Establishment Of Farm Reserve Bank

The Taylor University debate at Upland, on the agricultural problem in the United States and how it can best be solved, between the leaders of the three farm groups in Indiana and moderated by the dean of agriculture at Purdue, drew an overflow crowd of farmers, and at the same time created thinking interest in the farm problem and its solution.

The following paragraphs are excerpts from the speech given by John Rader, president of the Indiana Farmers Union, representing about 6,000 farm families in Indiana.

Mr. Chairman, students and faculty of Taylor University, ladies and gentlemen: It is a privilege to appear on this panel and to have the opportunity to discuss one of the most important problems that is confronting America—indeed, the world. At a time when the shadow of famine hangs over most of the world, America is choking in its abundance. When the world looks to us as the chosen people who live in a land of too much, our energies and our resources are being wasted in a sea of God-given grain.

**National Problem** This is not a problem that can be solved by insurance companies, by the board of directors of processing companies, by tax-supported colleges, or even by those of us who are mere farmers. It is a national problem—no, it is a national catastrophe—that concerns each and every one of us.

Today the best farmers in the world are on America's farms. Those among us that were not experts have been driven into the cities or into bankruptcy; and we Americans who are good Americans must do what we can to help our country cousins who have managed to survive our present crisis to remain in their rural homes.

We must dedicate ourselves to save individual capitalism on America's farms, but we must be practical in our thinking. We cannot save the farmers and destroy our government. The tremendous growth in the spending of taxpayers' dollars on the agricultural waste program has multiplied itself so quickly that today it must be stopped. If it continues to grow, it has the potential of not only

bankrupting the American farmer but the American taxpayer as well.

Our forefathers pioneered Indiana because they wanted to be land-owners, members of a free society, businessmen, willing to take the chances that go along with free enterprise. But they were too good at their jobs. They were too successful. They became too mechanized and they managed to overproduce. They created an agricultural robot that didn't need rest and that even today doesn't have a key to turn it off.

#### How Others Do It

But other businesses almost as large as agriculture managed to control their automation. Most factories don't operate at capacity. Many of them operate on one eight-hour shift a day, forty hours a week. A few of them may even run two shifts, but at least 90% of our factories operate at less than 50% of capacity. Because of the American way of life we can overproduce almost any product, but if we do we jeopardize a fair price at the market-place, and this no business can live without. We control manufacturing; we control our privately-owned utilities; we even control the number of taxicabs we have in the city. So control is not new to capitalism. And this is what I propose for the farmer: a good sound system of capitalistic control, a control that will be the farmer's responsibility and not that of the government; it will be at the farmer's expense and not at the expense of the American taxpayer.

#### Business Approach

Farmers are businessmen. They want a good, sound, just, proven business approach to their farm program. This I feel the Farmers Union has, and I would like to introduce our solution this evening. I have in my hand the first issue of what I propose as the new Federal Farm Reserve Bank of America. It is based on the principles of any federal franchise, such as the American Telephone and Telegraph, and it specifically encompasses the rules and regulations that now govern our banks. This program, based on the establishment of a farm federal reserve corporation, will reduce the national surplus, reduce government spending, control farm production, improve farm income, insure agricultural stabilization, conserve our natural resources, and maintain adequate agricultural reserves. Copies of the Federal Farm Reserve Bank Bill have been made available to the members of this panel, and I have an ample supply of them which will be handed out to those requesting them after the program.

Because of the magnitude of the farm program in America today, no single organization can expect to pass their specific farm bill. So, instead, I submit this bill to you for your suggestions and considerations, so that we can amend it with your recommendations and again establish free enterprise through government-directed self-restraint.
