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NBC Television hopes to film
two services at the Moscow Baptist
Church for American network view-
ing. The plan is a joint effort of
NBC and the Southern Baptist Con-
vention's Radio and Television
Commission.

The state of Ohio has a new mot-
to, which comes from the New
Testament. The motto reads, "With
God All Things Are Possible."
It is the first in Ohio since an
earlier one was repealed in 1867
because it smacked too much of
empires and royalty. The new mot-
to comes from Matt. 19:26, "But
Jesus beheld them unto them, with
men this is impossible, but with
God all things are possible."

In Berlin, a new Jewish Com-
munity Center has been opened
on a historic site. The new edifice
has been constructed around the
ruins of a great synagogue de-
stroyed by Hitler's Brown Shirts in
1938. Berlin's mayor, Willy Brandt,
spoke at the building's dedication.
He referred to the event as "a
good day in the life of (Berlin),"
and added, "Let us hope this
building will become a symbol of
tolerance."

Buddhism is still numerically
dominant in Korea. Christian bod-
ies are in second place with 1,440,
000 members. Protestant Chris-
tians are divided into fifteen denomi-
nations, Roman Catholics number
242,000. Christianity in 1959 is mark-
ing its seventy-fifth anniversary in
Korea. There are some 19 or 20 mil-
lion South Koreans that have no
formal ties with any religious or-
ganization.

A new \$103,000 vocational train-
ing and boarding school for 300
teen-age refugee boys and girls is
being built by the World Council
of churches in Spittal, Austria. The
new facility, for youngsters of all
faiths, will replace the adjacent
converted stables which have ser-
ved as quarters ever since the
school was founded in 1953 and is
accredited by the Austrian govern-
ment. Courses include history, hy-
giene, geography and languages as
well as trades, arts and crafts.
