
## Locals

## 12-Year-Old Boy Is Found Hanged

EAST PATERSON, N. J. (UPI) — The body of a 12-year-old boy was found hanging from a tree in a wooded area today with a woman's stocking drawn over one leg. He apparently had been hanged twice.

Police said there was no indication the boy had taken his own life. He was identified as Dennis Weinapel, who had been reported missing Friday night.

Members of his family said they believed the boy was murdered by a maniac. A doctor at the scene said the boy seemed to have died before he was hanged. An autopsy was scheduled.

He was hanging by a noose of heavy clothesline about 8 feet from a tree limb 15-feet off the ground. A broken lighter rope was tied to a nearby limb. The part of the rope that had broken off had a noose at the end and was found on the ground.

Investigators said the noose found on the ground was not frozen, although the ground was, indicating the lighter rope had been tied to the tree about the time Weinapel died.

The boy's corduroy trousers were rolled up above his knees. A shoe and sock were missing from his right foot and the woman's silk stocking drawn over the bared leg.

A search party of about 100 firemen was called out at about midnight when his mother reported him missing. The party found the body some 20 minutes later.

Dennis was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Weinapel. The father is a maintenance man.

His mother said he was a boy who "loved life" and never ran away from home.

"I think somebody murdered him. Some maniac," she said.
