

## Another Power Election

A total of 138 Decatur residents signed a petition asking the city council to hold a third election on the power question. This is slightly less than the number of signers on the last petition, but 38 more than enough to meet the legal requirement of 100 petitioners.

The city must now set a time for the election that will be suitable for the county election board. The city, probably from the income to the light plant, will then have to pay the cost of this third election.

As we have pointed out before, it is to the advantage of this community to settle the power question finally and speedily. It was two years ago when I&M first made the offer. Surely everyone who plans to study the question has had ample time to do so. Every facet has been argued and counter-argued time and again.

The main remaining argument of those who wish to prevent the sale of the plant is this: to do so would place Decatur in the hands of a giant monopoly, which will be able to raise rates and make power expensive.

Now there is no doubt but that I&M is a monopoly in the areas in which it sells power. But it is not an uncontrollable monopoly in any sense of the word.

To raise rates, or to lower them, it must appear before the public service commission and argue its case. The city of Decatur, the citizens committee, the betterment association, or any group of private citizens would be informed, through legal advertising, and news stories, and have ample time to appear.

Now this is exactly the same procedure that would occur if the city of Decatur would want to raise rates. Each individual has just as much right, and power, to stop I&M from raising rates as he has to stop Decatur.

But I&M is no more interested in raising rates than the people of Decatur are interested in having them raised. They make their profit by

(1) Making and distributing electricity in the most efficient manner. Decatur cannot do this, because it does not have and cannot get, the capital necessary today to produce power in competition with private industry.

(2) By keeping its customers, both rural and city, industrial and commercial, happy with good, prompt service and low rates due to number 1. Again, Decatur cannot, and is not, nor did it, under former Mayor Doan, satisfy the rural customers, the industrial customers, nor those in new, growing areas where electric heat is used.

(3) By encouraging the use of new electric services, from electric heat to electric water heaters to electric blankets, clocks, washers, etc. This is something that the publicly-owned city plant has never even attempted to do. I&M will help local stores increase the sales of their own electric appliances. The local I&M office will not retail these appliances.

I&M is a large, efficient corporation. It is, according to private studies made by Indiana University, the most efficient private company operating in Indiana. Decatur needs plentiful, cheap and efficient power to grow.

## Christian Growth Institute Is Held

More than 75 people attended the Christian growth institute at St. John's Lutheran church on route 27, north, Monday night. It was sponsored jointly by the Lutheran Women's Missionary League of St. Paul's church (Preble) and St. John's church. Mrs. E. C. Doehrmann was chairman of the institute.

Both topics were presented by the Rev. Edwin A. Neger of St. Paul's Lutheran church, Fort Wayne. In speaking on "Christian Service," he gave the Biblical reasons, motive, as well as the amount of service, the aim and reward of the same.

The group then broke up into buzz sessions for discussion of the topic. Reporters for the buzz sessions were Mrs. Rudy Meyer, route 1; Mrs. Ed Reinking and Mrs. Robert Weber of route 2; and Mrs. Carl Buss and Mrs. Robert Scheumann of route 1, Hoagland. Revs. Neger, Louis A. Schulenburg, and E. A. H. Jacob, and Marvin Meyer and Herbert Witte were counsellors of the five groups.

The second topic presented by Rev. Neger was a phase of Christian service, a report on Lutheran world relief in India. He illustrated his lecture with color slides taken on his inspection trip which he made for Lutheran world relief some time ago.

Doughnuts and coffee were served during the coffee break.

The Rev. O. Carl Brown, a representative of the missionary church association, will speak and show slides at the First Methodist church in Decatur Sunday evening at 7:30 o'clock. Rev. Brown has had three years of missionary service in Haiti, West Indies. He is a graduate of Taylor University, New York Biblical Seminary, Nyack Missionary College and New York University, and has done graduate work at the University of Oklahoma and at Middlebury College in Vermont.
