

Indianapolis Man Is Arrested By FBI

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — Robert J. Pitcher, 31, Indianapolis, was in Marion County Jail today following his arrest by FBI agents Saturday on a charge of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for burglary. Pitcher was arrested on the basis of a federal complaint filed by Daviess County authorities who accused him of burglarizing an Odon grocery last Dec. 3 and then fleeing to California. Bond was set at \$10,000.

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Move Underway For Naming Of Missile Czar

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A new move for creation of a missile "czar" appeared likely today in the wake of statements by two military leaders on the short and long term dangers to the United States.

The short-term danger, according to Air Force Gen. Thomas S. Power, is that in two years Russia may have enough intercontinental missiles to launch a massive nuclear attack on this country.

The long-term hazard, retiring Army Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris, is that at the present rates of progress Russia may completely dominate space within 10 years.

Brooks Disagrees

Medaris, whose retirement from the Army became effective Sunday, said in a farewell interview with Missiles and Rockets magazine that all missile and space activities should be placed under a joint military command.

Chairman Overton Brooks (D-La.) of the House Space Committee disagreed with Medaris, but said: "We've got to have more one-man control. I don't want dictatorship — but something's got to be done about this bickering and back-biting that is still going on."

Rep. Chet Holifield (D-Calif.), chairman of the congressional subcommittee on radiation, said figures developed by his group last year take on a new significance in the present situation.

Views Striking Power
Holifield said that if Russia launched 260 missiles with H-bomb warheads at 224 American targets, 50 million Americans would be killed and 20 million injured.

The 260 missiles is approximately the number that Power, chief of the Strategic Air Command, believes the Russians could have sometime in 1962.

By coincidence, 260 is also the number of intercontinental ballistic missiles that America has "programmed" so far. But there is no chance that they could all be emplaced before late 1963 or 1964.

Planning To Attend Annual Convention

Moderate Weather Continues In State

United Press International The last traces of January snows vanished from the Indiana landscape today as moderate weather continued with no cold waves in sight.

The five-day outlook for Hoosierland indicated above-normal temperatures would prevail through this week with little or no precipitation.

The weekend was on the damp side, with heavy fog Saturday night which froze into a white coating on trees and shrubbery. Foggy conditions were reported over most of the state again this morning.

Temperatures climbed into the 40s over most of the state Sunday, but at Fort Wayne the high was only 31. Elsewhere it ranged from 40 at South Bend to 50 in the Cincinnati area.

Overnight lows ranged from 27 at Fort Wayne to 32 at South Bend.

Hights today will range from 35 to 50, lows tonight from 25 to 35, and highs Tuesday from the low 30s to near 40. Mostly cloudy conditions will prevail.

The five-day outlook indicated temperatures will average 4 to 8 degrees below normal highs of 28 to 46 and normal lows of 13 to 30. "A little colder south Tuesday, otherwise only minor day-to-day changes in temperature," the outlook said, adding that there will be little if any precipitation. If there is any, it will come as occasional rain extreme south tonight or Tuesday and rain or snow south and snow flurries north late in the week.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Agriculture Department estimated today that more than 28 million acres of cropland would be held out of production in 1960 under conservation reserve contracts. This is about 5,500,000 acres more than were in the reserve last year.

Under the conservation reserve, the government pays farmers to withhold general cropland from production for periods of 3-10 years, while they carry out soil water, and wildlife conservation practices.

The department said cropland in the reserve in 1960 had been producing substantial quantities of surplus crops in recent years.

Any cropland is eligible for the reserve. Generally, it must have produced a crop or been in a regular crop rotation during the year immediately preceding the first year of the contract.

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Added Acreage In Reserve Contracts

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The American Farm Bureau Federation proposed Sunday night a four-point wheat legislative program built around an expanded

conservation reserve, elimination of acreage controls and lowered price supports.

The conservation reserve would be built up from its present 28 million acres to about 60 million.

Farm Bureau officials said acres in three years. Cost of the program would result in small wheat acreage. The program will be presented to the Senate Agriculture Committee in hearings Tuesday and Wednesday.

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
