EAST CHICAGO, Ind. (UPI) — An East Chicago steelworker was

shot to death here Sunday and police arrested Joseph C. Cobb, 41, Gary, in connection with the slaying.

Authorities said Henry James, 22, was shot to death in the home of Mrs. Helen Cobb, 35, Cobb's former wife.

Cobb was taken to city jail on an open charge when he called police after the shooting.

Parcel Post Price Increase Effective

WASHINGTON (UPI) — From now on, you will have to pay more for parcel post.

Effective Sunday midnight, rates went up an average of 17.2 per cent on fourth class mail, including parcels and catalogues.

The higher rates, authorized last Nov. 20 by the Interstate Commerce Commission, are aimed at boosting Post Office revenue by 88 million dollars a year.

Humphrey Out Of Indiana Primary

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—Indiana Democrats prepared to welcome two more possible presidential nominees this week on the heels of a visit by Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, an announced presidential candidate.

Humphrey told an Indianapolis gathering Saturday night that "old fogeys have been replaced by young fogeys" in the Republican party.

Humphrey addressed a Franklin D. Roosevelt dinner sponsored by the Marion County Young Democrats. The Minnesota Democrat has some backers in Indiana but no organization and indicated that he would not enter the Hoosier presidential primary.

However, Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts, who will be in Indiana Thursday and Friday, is expected to enter the Indiana primary. Kennedy is scheduled for appearances in Lake and Vigo Counties.

Sen. Lyndon Johnson of Texas, Senate majority leader, also a potential presidential candidate, will speak at the Indiana Jefferson-Jackson dinner in Indianapolis Saturday.

Humphrey said in his Indianapolis talk that Vice President Richard Nixon has taken a "negative Republican position" on all major issues. He identified those issues as Taft-Hartley law, social security, housing, farm price sup-

Ohio State Is Well In Front In Big Ten

CHICAGO (UPI)—Winless Michigan invades the lair of unbeaten Ohio State tonight to open the second half of the Big Ten basketball campaign.

The Buckeyes, who have beaten the likes of Illinois, Indiana and Michigan State, were not expected to have much trouble in improving their runaway league lead to 6-0 at the expense of the Wolverines.

The Buckeyes, getting hotter by the game, appeared a good bet to top the school scoring record set only Saturday night in a 111-79 romp over the defending champions from Michigan State.

Four other teams were scheduled tonight. Minnesota, running a full game behind the Buckeyes, goes to Michigan State in dire need of a victory to stay in the race, and Northwestern tackles Indiana on the Hoosier court.

Gophers Rally Late
The Gophers stayed alive by rallying in the second half Saturday to defeat Wisconsin, 86-72, and Purdue handed Michigan its fourth straight loss, 83-63.

Indiana ended a 19-day stretch of idleness by beating DePaul, 82-78, and Illinois defeated Notre Dame 71-67, in other Saturday night action.

The Buckeyes' 111 point total was two points better than the previous high scored this season against Delaware and their 49 field goals was only shy of the Big Ten record set by Indiana against the Buckeyes last season.

Sophomore Jerry Lucas won scoring honors with 25 points although he missed almost 11 minutes of the contest. The Buckeyes' balanced offensive produced four players in the double-figure bracket, and two others missed by a bare point.

Walker Hits 27
Horace Walker's 27 points was high for the Spartans. But Walker, the Big Ten's second-ranked scorer, failed to get his usual help from Lance Olson, who was saddled with four fouls in the first half and wound up with only 11 points.

The Gophers, who aren't scheduled to face Ohio State until the last day of the season (March 5), survived a first half scare from winless Wisconsin and then hit for 48 points in the final 16 minutes for their fifth win against two defeats.

Terry Dischinger, Purdue's ace sophomore, scored 26 points, well below his 31-point per game average. Coach Ray Eddy used 17 players in the victory over Wisconsin.

Indiana's Walt Bellamy turned in the best scoring performance of the night, scoring 34 points against DePaul, 19 of them in a second half spurt.
