Big O Sets Scoring Mark Monday Night

You'd never think Oscar Robertson was bored with college basketball.

The University of Cincinnati All-American reportedly was ready to quit school last year and join the Harlem Globetrotters. But he decided to stick around for his senior year because he wanted to add two more national scoring records to his bulging portfolio.

The records Robertson set his sights on this season were the major college three-year record of 2,338 points set by Frank Selvy of Furman (1952-53-54) and the all-time career mark of 2,587 established by Dick Hemric of Wake Forest over a four-year span (1952-53-54-55).

Robertson yawned his way through the Drake contest, surpassing Selvy's record with two quick layups in the first six minutes. Play was interrupted at this point as the six-foot-five forward from Indianapolis posed for photographers.

Robertson completed his record-breaking night by totaling 18 of 20 free throws, nine of 21 field goal attempts, 12 rebounds and seven assists.

West Gets 39
Jerry West, another All-American who has been playing in Robertson's shadow for the past two seasons, tallied 39 points and 23 rebounds in leading fifth-ranked West Virginia to a 101-71 victory over Virginia Military.

In the Big Ten conference, fourth-ranked Ohio State remained unbeaten in six league outings by routing Michigan, 99-52, as Jerry Lucas scored 23 points; Michigan State upset Minnesota, 94-63, and Indiana turned back Northwestern, 76-58, in a rough game that featured a fist fight between Indiana's Charley Hall and the Wildcats' Willie Jones.

Jim Mudd, one of the nation's top scorers, totaled 36 points in leading North Texas State to an 84-78 Missouri Valley Conference victory over Wichita, while Colorado surprised Iowa State, 70-55, and Nebraska edged Missouri, 64-59 in Big Eight Conference action.

Don Stanley scored six points in overtime as ninth-ranked Texas A & M opened a two game California invasion by edging San Francisco, 69-65; Princeton whipped Colgate, 70-57; Mississippi breezed past LSU, 76-61; Tulane downed Mississippi State, 61-47, and Alabama beat Vanderbilt, 61-54, and a 28-point spurge by Gary Phillips sparked Houston to an 80-69 triumph over Oklahoma City University.

Buckeyes Rout Michigan, Add To Loop Lead

CHICAGO (UPI) — Ohio State continued its merry roll through the Big Ten basketball schedule today, going two games ahead of second place Minnesota.

The Buckeyes, with Monday night's 99-52 rout of Michigan actually had a better edge than that over their closest pursuers, because the Gophers had three games in the lost column to none for the unbeaten leaders.

The Gophers fell behind, losing, 84-63, to Michigan State, the Buckeyes' Saturday night victims. Ohio State has eight more games to play and Minnesota eight. The two teams meet for the only time on March 5, the campaign's last day.

The Wolverines, who have yet to win a Big Ten contest in five starts, didn't manage a field goal until their foes had raced to a 9-0 lead. The taller Buckeyes sank 44 of 86 field goal attempts to Michigan's 18 of 68.

Wilke, Olson Hit 24
Michigan State, bouncing back from an 111-79 setback at Ohio State Saturday afternoon, came from behind twice to beat the Gophers. Horace Walker, the league's second-ranked marksman, shared scoring honors with teammate Lance Olson, each hitting for 24 points.

The Indiana-Northwestern contest was marred by 36 fouls and a fight between Willie Jones of the Wildcats and Charley Hall of the Hoosiers, who exchanged blows as the half ended.

Walt Bellamy and Frank Radovich, Indiana's top scorers, were yanked by Coach Branch McCracken for accumulating seven fouls between them before the intermission.

Bellamy, who missed 20 minutes of the game, finished with 15 points and Radovich, who sat out 18 minutes, got 13. The Hoosiers' high man was Herbie Lee with 16, and game scoring honors went to Northwestern's Willie Jones, who collected 17.

Four conference games are scheduled Saturday, starting with the Ohio State-Northwestern matinee television game at Evanston, Ill.

In other games, Illinois is at Michigan, Indiana at Wisconsin and Purdue at Michigan State. Iowa and Minnesota are idle.

Aaron Seeks \$75,000 Pact From Braves

Hank Aaron wants \$75,000, double what he earned in 1959, and it's his for the asking if he can pull a mathematical miracle.

All he has to do is prove to the Milwaukee Braves he was twice as good last season as the year before.

"There's no question Aaron was a lot better last year than he was the year before," conceded General Manager Johnny McHale, "but not 100 per cent better."

From his home in Mobile, Ala., Aaron said he was "very disappointed" with the first contract sent him by the Braves. It called for a boost over last year's estimated \$37,500 but nothing like the 100 per cent hike he is asking.

Bob Turley was given a substantial raise for posting a 21-7 record in 1958 but the Yankees look some of that money back Monday on the basis of his disappointing 8-11 mark last season.

Turley was in the \$30,000-\$33,000 bracket in 1959. This year he'll be working for somewhere between \$27,000 and \$29,000.

Buzzy Bavasi of the world champion Dodgers announced the signing of five players, including three rookies. The two holdovers who signed were second string catcher Yip Hines and pinch hitter Rip Repulski, and the three rookies were shortstop Earl Robinson, pitcher Phil Ortega and catcher Gene Conaway.

The Cubs signed shortstop William J. Ott, a 19-year-old freshman at St. John's University in New York, for the Lancaster farm club in the Eastern League.

California's Bears Rated College Tops

NEW YORK (UPI) — California's defending NCAA basketball champions today cracked Cincinnati's eight-week grip on first place in United Press International's major college ratings.

Coach Pete Newell's Golden Bears, who believe the best offense is a good defense, collected 330 points in the latest balloting by the 35 leading coaches who rate the major schools for UPI. Cincinnati, which had held first place since the season began, slipped to second with 313 first-place votes and 322 points.

California reached the top after holding second place the past four weeks. The Bears have a 16-1 record and lead the major teams in defense.

West Virginia, beaten by William and Mary in last weekend's big upset, slipped from third to fifth.
