## Grim Battle Raging To Save Big Tanker

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A grim battle raged within sight of San Francisco early today with rescue vessels fighting howling seas for a helpless prize — the world's largest wine tanker.

The 21,800-ton Angelo Petri was tossed by 25-foot waves as three tugs and a Coast Guard cutter attempted to put lines aboard. The tanker carried a cargo of 2,500,000 gallons of wine, 1,500,000 gallons of cottonseed oil, and 1,500 tons of missile fuel.

Some Will Boycott Numerous representatives of non-Communist Latin American youth organizations, who were invited to a preparatory meeting in Santiago, Chile, last November, have since announced they will boycott the conference because it will be completely Communist-controlled.

U.S. sources said Castro's brother, Raul, has promised conference organizers that the Cuban government will put up money for the meeting if the congress is "properly oriented."

The congress is being advertised as a meeting of Latin American youth. But U. S. officials expect some of the leading figures from the Red bloc in Europe and a few Chinese Communists to be on hand to show their Western Hemisphere buddies just how such an affair should be handled.

**Catholic Group Opposed**

CHICAGO (UPI) — Charles B. Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, today took his organization's fight for a "corrected" farm program to city dwellers.

"I urge all Americans who live in cities, as well as on farms, to contact their congressmen and urge adoption of workable farm legislation," Shuman said in an interview.

Present national agricultural policies, Shuman said, are so "disruptive" that they endanger the nation's economy. The wheat program is particularly in need of revision.

Shuman, an Illinois farmer from Moultrie County, was interviewed in his skyscraper office from which he directs the AFBF, the nation's largest farm organization, composed of 1,602,117 member families.

Shuman said President Eisenhower's special farm message delivered to Congress Tuesday was pretty much in line with aims of the AFBF and thought that "members of both parties can live under the President's guidelines."

"The President's recommendations for wheat," Shuman said, "agrees with ours." Eisenhower said the wheat situation is "particularly acute." Under it farmers are restricted to an acreage allotment of 55 million acres with the government buying up surpluses at 75 per cent of the "fair" price. This is costing \$1,000 a minute.

The AFBF wants less government control and has called for elimination of acreage allotments and marketing quotas and a price support for wheat based on the support level for corn, which would result in a price of about \$1.30 per bushel, about 50 cents less than now.

the bow, flooding the engine room and disabling the rudder.

The vessel, drifting without power, flashed an "S-O-S" and dropped two anchors with the hope that at least one would catch and hold.

The Petri drifted helplessly for two miles toward destruction before the anchors caught. Coast Guard helicopters then picked up 14 of the crewmen and flew them to Ocean Beach, just 3 1/2 miles to the east.

Weather Seen Easing

Tugs were able to get two lines aboard the tanker Tuesday night, but both were snapped by the force of the sea.

The Petri raised enough power to pull one of its anchors up part way, but the captain, Edward A. Lehman Jr. of San Mateo, Calif., kept the other anchor fast because he had feared that the lines might not hold.

Time was an important factor in the battle. Although the heavy seas continued, a break was expected in the violent storm that ripped the coastal areas during the past three days.
