Democrats To Submit Farm Plan Measure

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House Democrats moved swiftly today to take up President Eisenhower's invitation to submit their own proposals for solving the nation's farm problem.

The Democrats planned to drop into the hopper their "Brannan Plan" bill which would set production curbs designed to keep supply in line with demand and provide direct government subsidies if prices fell below a certain level. In a special farm message to Congress Tuesday, Eisenhower repeated requests for elimination of wheat acreage controls and reduction of wheat price supports. But he said he would approve any constructive plan to curb the mounting wheat surplus.

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) said Eisenhower's invitation for alternative solutions showed Vice President Richard M. Nixon "is calling the shots" on the administration's farm policies.

Humphrey, who is campaigning in Oregon for the Democratic presidential nomination, said in a statement issued by his office that Eisenhower's message was "the first shot in Nixon's farm campaign." He said it was designed to get the GOP's "political house in order" for the 1960 elections.

Rep. W.R. Ponce (D-Tex.), one of the backers of the Democrats' "Brannan Plan" proposal, said the measure would "meet every requirement the President has listed except that it will not starve farmers off the farms."

Rep. George S. McGovern (D-S.D.), another backer of the bill, said the House Agriculture Committee would start hearings on the proposal immediately. He said the measure had a good chance of passage.

The bill would apply to any crop on which two-thirds of the producers agreed to limit production. Tobacco, sugar and wool would not be covered.

Prices would be set by the market. The government then would pay growers whatever subsidies were necessary to give them a return comparable to that available for the same effort and investment in "the average non-farm industry."

Under the bill no farmer could draw total subsidy of more than \$5,000 in any one year.

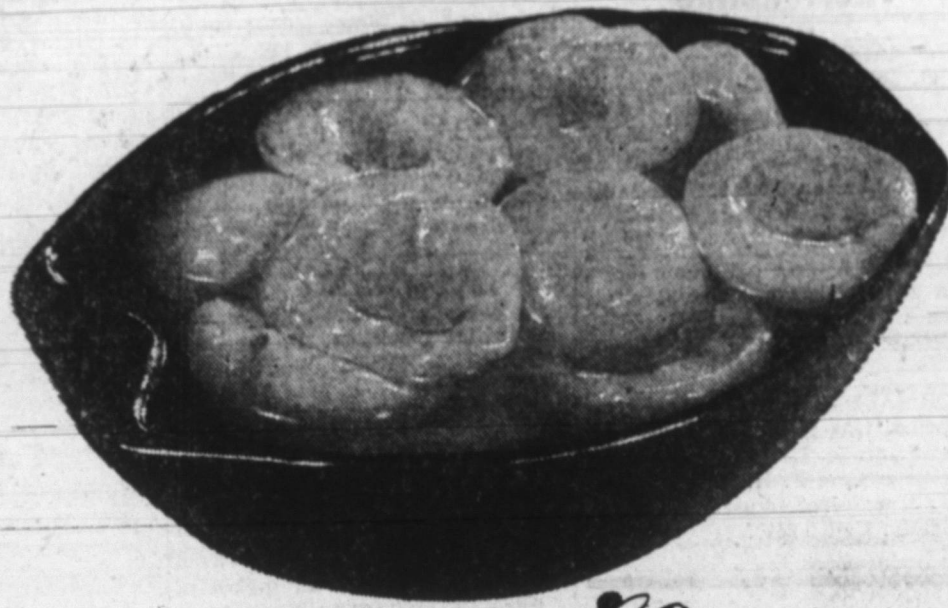

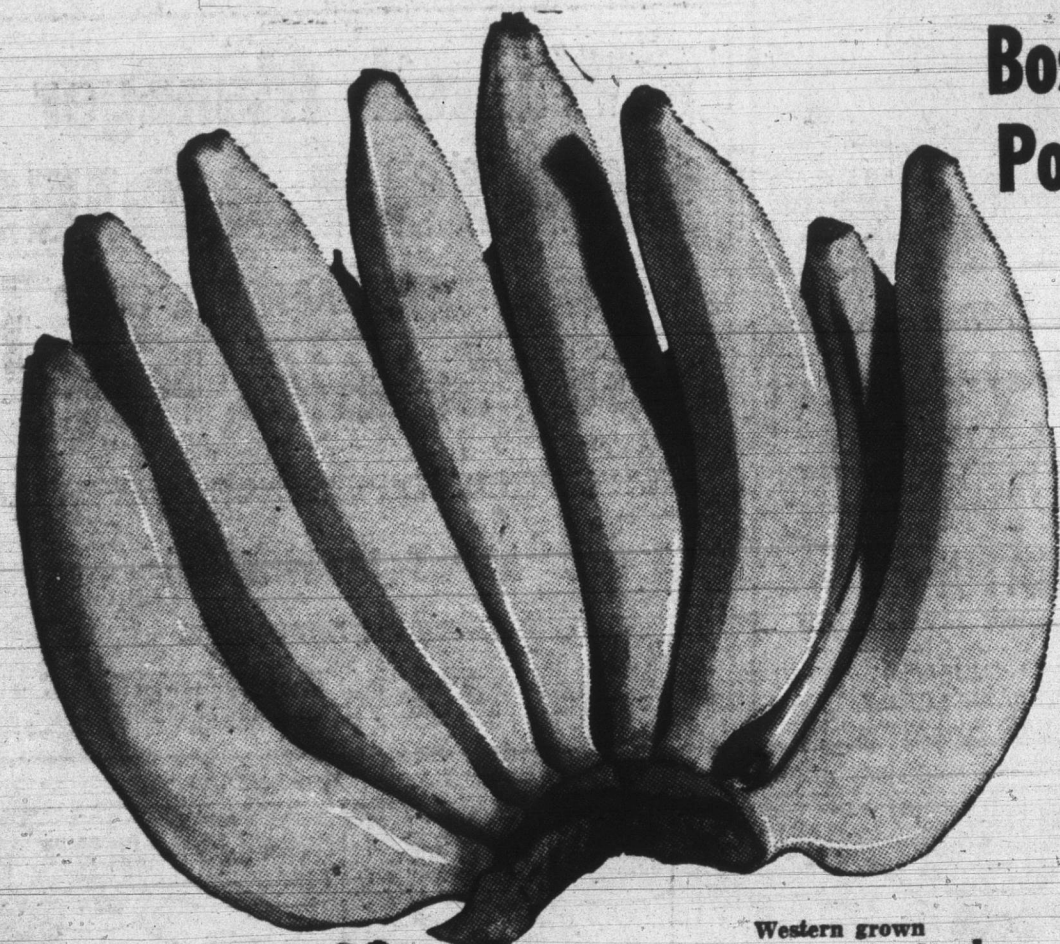
