**INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—**Gary Brown, a Redkey High School basketball player, was suspended for the remainder of the season—including tourney play for a slugging during a game against Berne Feb. 12.

The action was taken by the IHSAA following reports that Brown slugged James Hill after Brown drew his fifth personal foul and was sidelined with about three minutes remaining in the game.

IHSAA Commissioner L. V. Phillips said Hill lost four false teeth in the altercation, causing lacerations of the mouth. He also said referees Virgil Hoepfner and Norman Moser, Woodburn, criticized sportsmanship by Redkey coach Don Selvey during the game won by Berne, 74-56.

## Lloyd Reef Bows Perfect 300 Game

Lloyd Reef, a Decatur bowler, entered that sport's golden circle Monday night, notching the first sanctioned perfect game at the Mies Recreation Lanes.

In order to net a 300 game, 12 straight strikes are necessary. Reef, who lives at 810 W. Monroe street and works for the Yost Construction, did just that, and at the same time garnered the first 700 series in six years at the local bowling lanes.

Reef put together scores of 300, 181, and 254 for a total of 735, which is considerably above his 183 average with Oakdale Kennels. His team, by the way, tops the Major League bracket this half of the season.

## South Side To Meet Central In 1st Round

**INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)—**There'll be red-hot early collisions in Indiana's 50th annual high school basketball tourney at Fort Wayne and Indianapolis, the drawings revealed today.

In the Summit City, arch-rivals South and Central collide next Thursday evening in the fifth local sectional game.

South has won the Fort Wayne sectional four straight times and won 34 consecutive games in city competition—until last Friday—when Central clipped the string, 58-44.

The two teams split even during the season in their city series.

A tough upper bracket was dealt out at Indianapolis, with defending state champion Attucks colliding with city rival Shortridge Wednesday evening and city foes Cathedral and Secunia also meeting headon. Indianapolis Tech also was lumped into the upper bracket, while the lower half was decidedly weaker.

**Took 47 Minutes**

The 694 hopefuls in Hoosierland's four-week hardwood show which opens Feb. 24 were paired off in exactly 47 minutes from the 64 sectionals to the four-team finals at Butler Fieldhouse here March 19.

Several other early collisions of favorites in the preliminaries were assured, but for the most part, it was a balanced draw.

At Mishawaka, South Bend Adams and the host club were in the lower bracket, South Bend Central in the upper portion.

At Madison Heights, Anderson and Alexandria were lumped into the opposite bracket from Elwood.

Fort Wayne Catholic, another favorite in the Summit City sectional, was opposite South as Central.

At Evansville, Reitz apparently will have the lower bracket to itself, while Bosse, Lincoln and Central of the Pocket City will be battling in the upper portion.

Top-rated Muncie Central should gallop through its sectional in sweat clothes. The undefeated Bearcats, heavily favored to grab historic fifth state crown, open Friday afternoon against little Daleville.

**Madison vs. Austin**

Madison, also unbeaten and No. 2 in the state, gets its tourney baptism against Austin at Scottsburg Wednesday night.

East Chicago Washington and Gary Roosevelt, tied for third place, both hit the tourney trail Thursday—Washington at home against West NIHS rival Hammond Tech, Roosevelt against Tollestson of the Steel City.

Kokomo also can relax. The fifth-rated Wildcats, beaten only at Muncie, open against Camden Friday night. Bloomington opens against Mooresville at Martinsville, Jasper's newly-crowned Southern Conference champion against Ireland at Huntington, and Indianapolis Manual against Greenfield at Southport, all Thursday night.

The pairings were made by the Board of Control of the IHSAA. Decatur Catholic in the Adams County sectional was the first team picked in the blind draw by principal Forest G. Waters of Versailles. Hartford Center was pick No. 2.

Other interesting selections included Lewisville, featuring high-scoring Marion Pierce, against the host Trojans; Columbus and Shelbyville are in the same bracket at Columbus, and Western Conference titlist Brazil goes against a good Van Buren quintet at Clay City.

## Southeastern And Southwest Loops Knotted

They're starting the basketball season all over again in the Southeastern and Southwest conferences.

Georgia Tech, Auburn and Kentucky wound up in a three-way tie for first place in the SEC with 9-2 records, when Tennessee upset Tech, 37-36, and Kentucky's Comeback Kids turned back Vanderbilt, 68-60, Tuesday night.

A similar three-way tie for the Southwest Conference lead was produced when Texas shocked Texas A&M, 79-62, and Southern Methodist upended Rice, 75-58. That left Texas sharing first place with the Aggies and SMU, each boasting 7-2 league marks.

Glenn Campbell and Dalen Showalter teamed up to earn Tennessee its surprise victory over Georgia Tech at Knoxville. The eighth-ranked Engineers were leading 50-32 in the closing minutes when Showalter broke through for a free throw and a basket to reduce the Vols deficit to one point.

**Holy Cross Celebrates**

Seconds later, a Tech player accidentally kicked the ball out of bounds. The Vols relayed the ball to Campbell, who barreled down the middle of the court and tossed in the winning basket on a twisting lay-up at the final buzzer.

Showalter wound up with 19 points and 12 rebounds for Tennessee while jump-shooting Roger Kaiser had 26 points for the disappointed Engineers.

Holy Cross, named along with St. John's to the field for the National Invitation Tournament earlier in the day, celebrated with an 83-76 triumph over Boston University. It was the 11th straight victory for the Crusaders, who were led by soph Jackie Foley's 29 points.

Three other NIT nominees also soared to impressive victories, Providence whipped Rhode Island, 72-60; Cohen's 24 points; Baldwin-Wallace, 94-61, and Memphis State outclassed Loyola of the South, 54-38.

**E. Kentucky Forfeits**

Eastern Kentucky forfeited a key Ohio Valley Conference game to Western Kentucky when Coach Paul McBrayer pulled his team off the floor following a brief player scuffle late in the first half.

McBrayer charged that Western Kentucky Coach Ed Diddle shoved one of the Eastern players during the fracas. Western held a 38-20 lead at the time. After ordering his players to the dressing room, McBrayer advised the officials he was forfeiting the game.

Elsewhere, Carroll Youngkin's 34 points fired Duke to a 78-69 victory over Virginia. Virginia Tech converted 53.4 per cent of its shots in spanking Richmond, 85-53; Jeff Cohen's 24 points helped William and Mary down Davidson, 73-65; Mike Graney and John Deagrie led Notre Dame to a 79-62 triumph over Butler, and Arkansas whipped Texas Tech, 78-55.

Herman Frantz, principal of the Adams Central high school and sectional tourney manager, has announced the distribution of tickets for the Wednesday and Thursday sessions of the Adams Central sectional.

## Stuffy McInnis Of Baseball Fame Dies

IPSWICH, Mass. (UPI)—"Stuffy" McInnis, the stylish, little target of Connie Mack's "100,000 infield" on the Philadelphia Athletics half a century ago, died Tuesday at the age of 69.

Stuffy, whose real name was John P. McInnis, stood only 5 feet 8 inches, but overcame his slight handicap to become one of the slickest fielding first basemen that baseball has ever known.

McInnis once went through an entire season (in 1921 for the Boston Red Sox) and made only one error. Another time he went 163 games and handled 152 chances without an error. Both records still stand.

"I got tired of watching those six-foot first basemen fail to make the catch," he once reminisced. "So I decided to become a first baseman myself."

Stuffy played in the major leagues for 19 years and compiled a .990 fielding average. He held a lifetime batting mark of .308. A little man among the "giants" of his day, he played on six pennant winning teams and was a member of the world champion team five times.

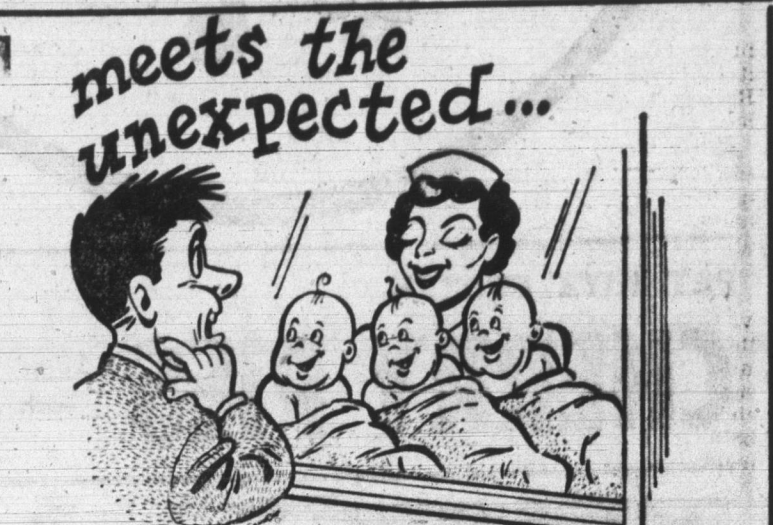
