Some Answers

Following are the answers to some questions which persons interested in schools may raise:

Will it be possible under the school corporation act to reorganize the county school districts in such a way that Preble, Union, and Blue Creek will remain outside of school districts, and Jefferson to maintain only grade schools?

Answer: No. Section 6. (3) (d) (1) says: "All county plans shall provide for the inclusion of all the area of the county in a school corporation or school corporations, in order to furnish efficient and adequate educational opportunity for all the pupils in grades one through twelve."

Can the county study committee prevent reorganization by stalling until the law expires?

Answer: No. Sec. 11 (1) provides that the function of the state reorganization commission shall devolve upon the commission on General Education of the State Board of Education.

Sec. 11 (2) provides that, if local school trustees or the state superintendent of public instruction deems further reorganization necessary to improve educational opportunities for the pupils in the county, such local trustees or the state superintendent shall submit plans to the state commission, which in turn will submit it to the electors of the corporations affected.

Two Of Fort Wayne's Teams Upset Victims

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — Sixty-four sectional champions will be crowned in Indiana's golden anniversary high school basketball tournament tonight, with the "little fellows" out to wreck what so far has been virtually a "big city monopoly."

After three days of firing in which the field of 694 was whittled down to the 256 sectional semi-finalists, nine of 10 members of the United Press International coaches' board "Big 10" were still alive.

The lone exception was ninth-rated Indianapolis Attucks, which surrendered its state crown Wednesday night.

Most of the "name" teams had easy afternoon tasks.

Top-rated Muncie Central, charging after an unprecedented fifth state crown, met Cowan-The Bearcats made their tourney debut Friday afternoon with a 90-49 conquest of little Daleville, their 21st consecutive victory.

Roosevelt vs Froebel
Other "soft touch" afternoon pairings were Kokomo - Delphi, Bloomington-Bloomington University at Martinsville, South Bend Adams-South Bend, St. Joseph at Mishawaka, unbeaten Madison-Madison Central at Scottsburg, Indianapolis Manual-Vernon Twp at Southport, and East Chicago Washington-city foe Roosevelt.

Gary Roosevelt, No. 2 in the state, and sixth-ranked Jasper had their work cut out, however. Roosevelt met Froebel of the Steel City, which beat the Panthers in overtime early in the season. And Jasper's Southern Conference champs clashed with host Huntington, which they licked by only three points during the campaign.

Still running strong among the small-town elite were Wabash Valley king Bloomfield, which trounced Jasonville at Switz City Friday night, 92-51, for its 25th victory in 26 games, also its 20th in a row. Concord, Bainbridge and Highland, all beaten but once during the regular season, and Waldron, Medora and Covington.

And at Fort Wayne, three rural outfits were set to "gang up" on Central of the Summit City - Huntington, Leo and Harlan.

Seventeen Champs Gone
Harlan, 9-11 for the season, upset Fort Wayne North, 76-60, while Huntington derailed Fort Wayne Catholic, 60-59, on Gay Martin's pair of freethrows with 21 seconds left. Only Monroeville in the late 1940s has ever beaten the Fort Wayne elite in the sectional.

Seventeen defending sectional champions have been eliminated, seven Friday. They were Shawswick at Bedford, Brighton at Kendallville, Terre Haute Gerstmeier, Huntington Catholic, North Vernon at Greensburg, Rensselaer at Kentland, and Wolcott at Monon.

Tech and Shortridge, which whipped Attucks, remained in the running at Indianapolis, but the three other 1959 finalists were still rolling. New Albany, though not expected to cut much ice this time, opened with a 65-54 win over Clarksville at Jeffersonville. Kokomo walloped Camden, 94-35, and Logansport reached the sectional semis Thursday night.

Of the ranking teams, Jasper and Manual had the toughest time advancing. Jasper led St. Ferdinand by only two points with a minute left, but splurged to finish with a 61-54 decision. Manual

Gary Roosevelt humbled neighbor Edison, 95-42, and Madison cashed in on its 20th victory at the expense of city foe Shaw Memorial, 96-46, Buster Briley canning 34 points.

Hottest scorer so far appeared to be New Castle's John Lee, who has rolled in 85 points in two games. He got 33 in an 88-82 win over Spiceland Friday night.

Huntingburg knocked off Springs Valley, a tourney finalist two years ago, 55-45, by caging the last 10 points.

Pine Village, which hasn't won a game all year, won from Richland Twp. at Williamsport, 58-53, and at Portland. Montpelier avenged a 17-point drubbing by Redkey with a 61-52 decision.

Other interesting afternoon scraps included Elkhart - Goshen, Anderson - Alexandria at Madison Heights, Aurora - Lawrenceburg at Rising Sun, Wiley - Garfield at Terre Haute, and Columbus-Shelbyville.

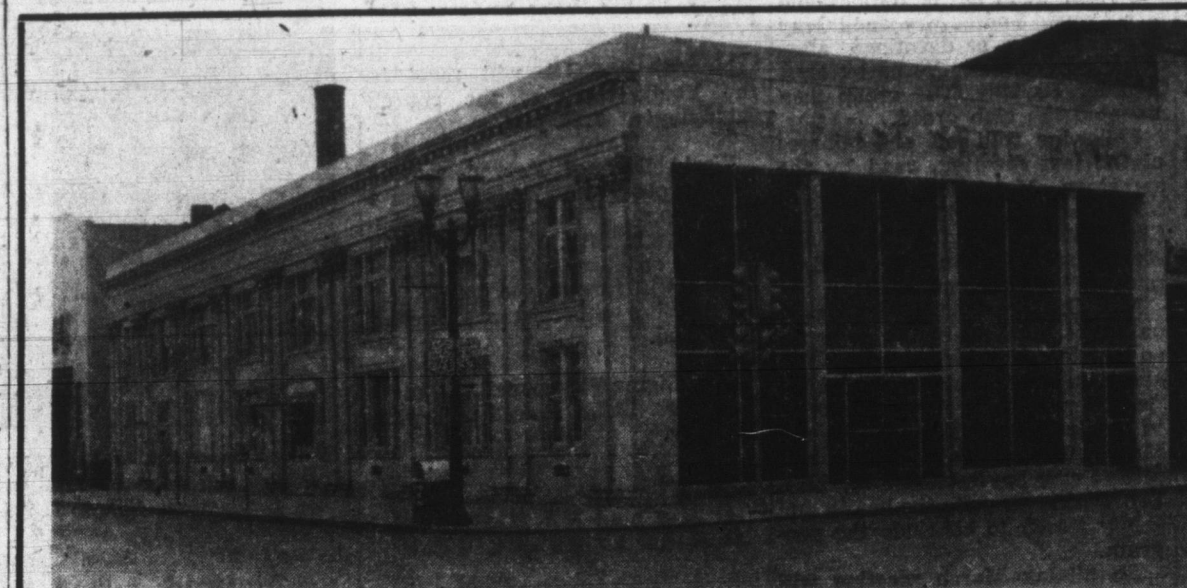
